Chicago Shelter Operations Situation Report

Situational Awareness

The Emergency Operations Center was made aware of a bomb and active shooter threat at approximately 1230hrs that was received by Chicago Public Libraries. The threat involved the Harold Washington Public Library. Out of an abundance of caution, the EOC quickly relocated the new arrivals shelter in the HWL basement including all new arrivals and staff members. These individuals were taken to the Social Club shelter down the road while the EOC and CPS began to map out a plan for relocation and reuniting family members who may have been absent from the shelter at the time of relocation. CPS is working to identify students who may be at school and shelter staff are working to identify any adults who may have been away at the time of relocation. Once all family members and students have arrived at Social Club and have been accounted for by shelter staff, we will be transporting all 60 family members to the Inn of Chicago (family shelter) later this afternoon.

14 SEP 2023

Border News:

- For the week ending 2 SEP 2023, **1,602** noncitizens provided an intended destination of the Chicagoland Area, up from **1,471** last week.
- Up to 200 Venezuelan migrants who tried to surrender to U.S. authorities Tuesday at the border wall in South-Central El Paso were kept at bay by Texas National Guard troops, witnesses said. The migrants began crossing the Rio Grande from Juarez, Mexico after rumors spread about U.S. authorities allegedly letting asylum seekers come in between ports of entry. Many migrants have grown tired of waiting for an appointment, so they surrender themselves to a border control agent. Texas National Guard troops standing behind razor wire told migrants they could not pass. Some in the crowd remained on the American concrete embankment of the Rio Grande, while others stayed on the Mexican side until nightfall. https://www.borderreport.com/immigration/texas-national-guard-turns-back-migrants-at-border-wall-near-el-paso/
- Department of Homeland Security officials confirmed that the federal funds they provide to local organizations can be and are used to buy bus, train and plane tickets for migrants to come to Chicago. About a third of new arrivals are bused here by Texas Gov. Greg Abbott, but many are also sent by Texas and Denver organizations using federal money without coordinating with Chicago officials.

- 11 SEP 2023, a Sgt admonished a migrant mother with the assistance of an interpreter. An unattended migrant child was observed in the east portion of the lobby who was changing his clothing. The Mother was advised the child could not change his clothing in the lobby and had to be with an adult at all times. The child appeared to be around 3-4 years old. He was left unattended for approximately 20 minutes prior to the return of his mother.
- 11 SEP 2023, a case report was provided for an individual who informed the desk that there he was propositioned for sex in exchange for money outside the district station door by a female. No arrest was made at this time.
- 9 SEP 2023, the migrants in the 008 District were upset that they had to use a porta potty. They pulled furniture and garbage cans onto 63rd Street and blocked the street causing traffic to come to a standstill. When Officers went outside, they took one of the subjects into custody. The subject began resisting arrest. During the arrest process, one of the Sergeants had his wrist cut and another Officer sustained cuts/scratches on her forearm. During this process, the other migrants began to encircle and close in on the Officers until additional Officers arrived and were able to restore order and allow traffic to flow again.

o 014 District:

- 11 SEP 2023, A migrant toddler attempted to enter the secure area behind the front desk. This child was not attended by a parent or guardian. The mother was located, and the child was reunited with their mother.
- 11 SEP 2023, an incident regarding two very small (2 3 years of age) migrant children who were not being supervised by their parents. Two small children made their way to the second floor of the 14th District, and almost entered the roll call room. The staircase is very unsafe for children, it has large openings where they can easily fall through. The guardrails also pose as a safety hazard, they are horizontal, making it very easy for them to be climbed. 014 placed a table temporarily, to prevent the children from climbing up the stairs but again this is still hazardous for all. 014 is requesting a child safety gate to prevent any injuries.
- 07 SEP 2023, a request was placed for a migrant family causing a disturbance to be transferred to the 022 District.

o 012 District:

- 11 SEP 2023, there was an aggravated assault by a migrant living at 012 District versus another migrant staying there, where a knife was brandished and and he threatened the victim. Offender was arrested by CPD.
- 11 SEP 2023, a migrant who resides in the 012 District was arrested for burglary after stealing items from a nearby Church.
- 07 SEP 2023, officers were dispatched to a City Key ID Event held at Harrison Park (1824 S. Wood St.) for a fight that broke out between migrants in line. One arrest for battery to another migrant was made. The offender is currently residing on CHA property in the encampment next to 012 District. David Greising: Gov. J.B. Pritzker's willingness to tackle pension problem is a breakthrough

Perhaps the most lasting and important part of Gov. J.B. Pritzker's financial plan for Illinois was not even included in his budget address last week.

For far too long, Illinois has held a shameful worst-in-the-nation status for protecting retirement income for thousands upon thousands of state workers and retirees. The \$142 billion in pension debt — unfunded liabilities — means the state has only 45% of the resources needed to cover its obligations.

Pritzker does have a plan, and that makes him the first Illinois governor in 30 years to propose a way out of this seemingly insurmountable pension problem. Nationally prominent pension experts I talked to over the last week expressed pleasant dismay that an Illinois governor at long last is taking on a problem that for decades has ravaged state budgets, driven away investment — and damaged Illinois' credit ratings, too.

The idea does not come in a vacuum, it's worth noting. Alternative options are out there, highlighted by one put forward by the Civic Committee of the Commercial Club of Chicago a year ago.

There likely will be time to debate the alternative options. Chances are, Pritzker's idea won't be taken up during the current legislative session. But let's embrace a breakthrough while we can — before the messy work of lawmaking gets underway and compromises and accommodations come into play.

For the first time in memory, an Illinois governor is proposing to fully fund Illinois' five statewide pension plans. The last one to try, Jim Edgar, aimed only for 90% funding, making Illinois the only state with a stated goal that has set its aim lower than 100%.

Pritzker plans to do this without raising taxes or cutting pension benefits. And he does so with no additional cost to budgets until 2030.

At that point, the state's contributions toward pensions would jump by as much as \$750 million per year through fiscal 2040, but the source is a form of found money: As a series of general obligation

bonds retire — followed by final payments on the detestable \$10\$ billion of pension bonds passed by then-Gov. Rod Blagojevich in 2018 — half of the sums previously earmarked for interest payments would instead go toward pensions.

The other half, incidentally, would go toward the state's rainy day fund, which has grown to \$2 billion due to shared effort by Pritzker and Comptroller Susana Mendoza. That's up from \$3 million left behind by Gov. Bruce Rauner — enough to run state government for, well, about 15 minutes.

How high a priority pensions will play in the spring legislative session remains an open question. One tell is pride of place: Pritzker's silence on the matter in his budget address was notable. Instead, the plan was consigned to the state's "budget book" — the 632-page compendium of every fiscal fancy on the administration's mind as it heads into the legislative session.

There are complicating factors that could block full pension paydown, too. The biggest potential hurdle: a need to address a problem with Tier 2 pensions, a program of decreased pension benefits that the state imposed on employees hired from 2011 forward.

For many retirees, Tier 2 benefits have not grown as fast as Social Security payments, and because most Illinois government pensioners are not eligible for Social Security, federal law requires the state to catch up. A state consultant's report last year estimated the cost of the Tier 2 makeup payments at \$5.6 billion through 2045 — nearly enough to wipe out the \$5.1 billion in savings Pritzker projects from his pension fix.

About those projected Pritzker savings: They're not as sizable as the savings estimated in the main alternative pension proposal, the one put forward by the Civic Committee, a group of prominent Chicago business leaders, last year. That plan calls for an incremental tax surcharge of 0.5% a year over 10 years on individuals and 0.7% on corporations — \$28.5 billion in new taxes over a decade, all of it set aside for pension payments.

The Civic Committee estimates its approach would save the state \$35 billion over 22 years, more than seven times as much as Pritzker's plan. And by front-loading pension payments for that first decade, the plan also would reduce the steep annual increases required under current state pension law. Those payments currently are slated to reach \$18 billion a year by 2045, or about 25% of the state's projected budget.

Pritzker's plan also calls for pension payments to remain above \$16 billion for fiscal years 2046 to 2048. By that point, under the Civic Committee plan, state payments would be about half that amount. But under the Civic Committee plan, it takes nearly a decade longer to reach full funding than under Pritzker's plan.

Still, a tax increase is a tax increase, and it's no wonder Pritzker prefers to avoid the ones proposed by the Civic Committee, especially in an election year.

All of which brings us to the question of timing. If Pritzker could get the votes for his pension plan in the spring legislative session, the state would be better for it. No plan is perfect, and the realistic

objective of achieving 100% funding by 2048, without reducing pension benefits, is the most serious proposal yet put forward by any elected official in Illinois.

If there's a legislative opening, the governor should take it. Yet, if the matter does not come to a vote this spring session, there is a chance the state could wind up even better off.

More time would allow for careful study of the relative merits of the two leading plans, Pritzker's and the Civic Committee's. It would allow time to factor the full cost of the Tier 2 fix into the equation.

More time would give all stakeholders — taxpayers, state workers, retirees, investors and others — a chance to assess the relative merits and weigh in with their concerns.

Not quite a year ago, Pritzker appeared at a private luncheon before the Civic Committee's parent organization and expressed interest in the group's plan. Now he has come up with one of his own.

Imagine that: Here in Illinois, the worst-in-the-nation state as measured by pension debt, and there are two worthy options in play. Before us lies an opening that our elected representatives, and our state, cannot afford to miss.

Capitol News Illinois, Democrats Head into Final Stretch of Session with Revenues on Track, 5/6/24

"With about three weeks to go before the Illinois General Assembly is scheduled to adjourn its spring legislative session, supermajority Democrats showed their strength as fiscal forecasters noted state revenues remain on track. April is typically a make-or-break month for state coffers, as income tax filings can often yield higher-or lower-than-expected returns, affecting the current budget just as lawmakers sit down to approve a spending plan for the year ahead. But for fiscal year 2024, which ends June 30, revenues are generally on track with where Gov. JB Pritzker's office predicted they would be in his February budget address. That means as budget negotiations enter the final stretch, any new state spending would largely rely on redistributing funds the governor proposed allocating elsewhere, rather than on new, unexpected revenues. The Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability noted that April revenues finished \$373 million ahead of last year's output. But that's partially due to the month having two more weekdays to process tax collections this year...COGFA's current outlook anticipates the year to end with \$52.6 billion in revenue. That's about \$2 billion more than what lawmakers projected when they passed the fiscal year 2024 budget last May, and \$374 million more than Pritzker estimated in February's budget address..."

Crain's Chicago Business, How Rescheduling Cannabis Would Aid Local Companies, 5/4/24.

"Removing marijuana from the federal government's most dangerous class of drugs will give cannabis companies a much-needed financial boost. Cannabis stocks rose quickly yesterday after reports that the Justice Department has agreed to recommend the change. But the real payoff comes from tax law. If marijuana is rescheduled from a Class 1 to a Class 3 controlled substance, cannabis companies such as Chicago-based GreenThumb Industries, Verano Holdings and Cresco Labs will be able to write off typical corporate expenses like other businesses. The long-awaited move will mean \$70 million to \$100 million to the bottom line, potentially starting this year, which will further boost the value of the companies. It represents relief for an industry battered by falling prices, increased competition, and steep taxes, as well as inefficiency that comes from a business that operates under a patchwork of rules that vary from state to state..."

News Gazette, Opinions Editor/Jim Dey, Governor's Sales Tax Cut Forces Mayors to Look for New Revenue, 5/4/24.

"While the proposal to eliminate the one-cent sales tax on groceries remains pending before the legislature, the mayors of Champaign and Urbana view the cut as requiring revisions to their proposed budgets....The state currently collects a one-cent-per-dollar sales tax on groceries and transfers that money to local municipalities. Champaign has estimated it will lose \$2.7 million in annual revenue and Urbana \$1 million....On a statewide basis, Pritzker's plan would cost municipalities \$325 million a year. Local officials across Illinois complained bitterly earlier this year, when Pritzker initially proposed eliminating the sales tax, and sought to persuade their local legislators to reject the idea...Pritzker said it is "clear that opponents of eliminating the grocery tax do not share" his vision of "providing relief, wherever possible, for Illinois families." In a recent commentary, Pritzker said he has taken a variety of steps to "increase funding for local governments," generating "a windfall of overall support for state government of an additional \$1.3 billion a year."

News Gazette, Tom Kacich, Regressive, How About the State Lottery, 5/3/24

"It's hard to disagree with Gov. J.B. Pritzker that the 1 percent sales tax levied on groceries in Illinois — to benefit local governments, not the state — is a regressive tax that disproportionately affects low-income households. Most

other states don't levy sales taxes on groceries. Still, eliminating the tax wouldn't yield significant savings to Illinois families...But if the governor and other state officials are serious about eliminating regressive taxes, how about the state lottery, which took in an astounding \$3.6 billion in the last fiscal year and is on pace to break that record this year? (Nationally, state lotteries took in more than \$100 billion last year...One of the poorest areas in downstate Illinois — and any part of Illinois — is the 62523 ZIP code in central Decatur. It has a median household income of \$12,663. Yet it recorded \$715,577 in retail lottery ticket sales, an average of \$807 for each of the 886 people living in the neighborhood. Put another way, Venice, Ill., a part of the Metro East St. Louis area and one of the poorest communities in Illinois, reported lottery sales last year of about \$1.64 million. That's close to the same amount as Winnetka (\$1.68 million), one of the wealthiest communities in the state. Winnetka's 60093 ZIP code has a population of 20,379, while Venice's 62060 ZIP code had a population of 4,847. Per capita lottery sales in poor Venice amounted to \$339, compared with wealthy Winnetka's \$82. The state lottery, despite the promise of fun, frivolity and financial winnings presented in its advertising, preys mostly on the poor and compulsive..."

Chalkbeat, Illinois legislature's spring session, Seven Education Issues to Watch, 5/6/24.

"The Illinois General Assembly is scheduled to end its spring session on May 24, leaving a few weeks to pass bills and send them to Gov. J.B. Pritzker's desk for final approval... What we're watching for in a final budget... ..Illinois child tax credit: During the pandemic, Congress expanded the child tax credit, providing families with monthly payments of between \$250 and \$300 per child, depending on their age. The program reduced child poverty rates temporarily, but it ended in 2021. Now, Illinois lawmakers — along with other state legislatures, such as Colorado — are proposing a state child tax credit. In Illinois, families could receive up to \$300 per child for children under the age of 17. Married couples who make less than \$75,000 and single people who make less than \$50,000 would be eligible...."

Wirepoints, Don't fall for the Progressive Income Tax Hike for Property Tax

Relief Tax Swap Referendum, 5/6/24.

"Should the Illinois Constitution be amended to create an additional 3% tax on income greater than \$1,000,000 for the purpose of dedicating funds raised to property tax relief?" That's the wording of a new advisory referendum that will be on the November ballot. The referendum question is just one part of a contentious bill that changed several election laws and was rapidly passed by a supermajority of Democrats this week. While the referendum might end up being nothing more than a political distraction, it could also be that lawmakers are gauging Illinoisans' appetite for another bite at a progressive income tax hike – this time with lower property taxes as a sweetener. The problem with a tax swap like the one proposed is it would do nothing to lower Illinoisans' overall tax burden....For one, the proposal would change Illinois' current flat income tax structure into a progressive tax structure. The proposal would create two tax brackets: taxpayer incomes up to \$1 million would be taxed at 4.95%. Every dollar above \$1 million would be taxed at a marginal rate of 7.95%. If that sounds familiar, that's because it is. Gov. J.B. Pritzker already tried to get a progressive income tax hike passed in 2020, but Illinoisans rejected the governor's "Fair Tax" amendment...Second, Illinoisans have no idea how lawmakers would decide who would get "property tax relief" and in what amount. But wealthy suburban areas could certainly expect to pay higher income taxes and get little property tax relief in return. Third, a permanent shift in tax revenues away from local property taxes and toward state income taxes would further centralize spending and power with lawmakers in Springfield. It's already hard enough to fight back against spending at the local level...Fourth, by not addressing the root cost drivers of Illinois property taxes, local taxes would keep rising anyway...Fifth, a 3% income tax surcharge on income above \$1 million would only drive-out wealthy taxpayers at an even faster clip than they're already departing..."

State Journal Register, Construction to Begin Soon on 4th Street in Springfield, What to Know, 5/5/24.

"The city of Springfield has targeted May 6 as the start of work for converting traffic on a 1.6-mile stretch of Fourth Street from one-way to two-way traffic.

That will include the setup of temporary barricades to close one lane of Fourth Street from South Grand Avenue to Dodge Street, said T.J. Heavisides, the city's chief traffic engineer. Traffic signals have already been in place, he said. The prep work will also include restriping the street with new yellow lines, minor striping at intersections and changes in signage. Adams Street from Sixth Street to Ninth Street will also be converted to two-way. The work schedule is dependent on the weather, Heavisides said. It is set to wrap up May 10, but he added that the city won't remove barriers until the signals are operative and the signages complete..."

State Journal Register, Cool, Wet Weather Predicted for Illinois this Summer, 5/6/24.

"The Old Farmers' Almanac has released its summer weather outlook, and unfortunately for Illinois it looks like it will be a cool and rainy summer. The prediction for nearly all of Illinois, including Springfield, Peoria, Rockford and Chicago, appears to be on the cooler and wetter side of things. There are western parts of Illinois that could be hotter and drier, according to the prediction. The cool and wet prediction for most of Illinois also covers most of Indiana as well...While all of Wisconsin is predicted to be hot, the southeastern part of the state like in Milwaukee are anticipated to see soggy weather while the northwest part of the state is expected to be drier this year...The Old Farmer's Almanac has stated that the accuracy of their predictions is about 80% to 85%. Scientific analysis however has shown a rate of about 50% accuracy..."

Statistics Show Lowest Southwest Border Encounters in More than Three Years

WASHINGTON — U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) released operational statistics today for June 2024, which show a significant decline in migrant encounters following a Presidential Proclamation announced June 4, 2024, by President Biden to temporarily suspend the entry of certain noncitizens across the southern border. Border Patrol encounters between ports of entry were **29%** lower than in May 2024 and were the lowest monthly total for the Border Patrol along the southwest border since January 2021 as well as lower than the number of encounters between ports of entry in June 2019, the last comparable year prior to the pandemic. CBP monthly reporting can be viewed on CBP's Stats and Summaries webpage.

"Recent border security measures have made a meaningful impact on our ability to impose consequences for those crossing unlawfully, leading to a decline of **29%** in U.S. Border Patrol apprehensions from May to June, with a more than **50%** drop in the seven day average from the announcement to the end of the month, and doubling the rate at which we removed noncitizens from U.S. Border Patrol custody in June," said Troy A. Miller, CBP Senior Official Performing the Duties of the Commissioner. "We are continuing to work with international partners to go after transnational criminal organizations that traffic in chaos and prioritize profit over human lives."

On June 4, 2024, the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Attorney General also jointly issued an interim final rule (IFR) that, consistent with the Presidential Proclamation,

generally restricts asylum eligibility for those who irregularly enter across the southwest land and the southern coastal border. The number of encounters at our Southwest Border have decreased by more than **50%** in the past six weeks. The Border Patrol's seven-day average has decreased to below 1,900 encounters per day.

Since the Presidential Proclamation and Interim Final Rule went into effect on June 5, DHS has removed or returned more than 70,000 individuals to more than 170 countries, including by operating more than 150 international repatriation flights.* Total removals and returns over the past year exceed removals and returns in any fiscal year since 2010 and a majority of all southwest border encounters during the past three fiscal years resulted in a removal, return, or expulsion.

Ensuring Border Security and Managing Migration

CBP, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), continues to expeditiously process, remove, and strengthen consequences for individuals who cross our borders irregularly. Individuals and families without a legal basis to remain in the U.S. are subject to removal pursuant to Title 8 authorities and are subject to a minimum five-year bar on admission as well as potential prosecution if they subsequently re-enter without authorization. No one should believe the lies of smugglers. The fact remains: the United States continues to enforce immigration law, and those without a legal basis to remain will be removed. Migrants attempting to enter without authorization are subject to removal under Title 8 authorities.

In June – the first month in which the Presidential Proclamation and IFR have been in effect – the U.S. Border Patrol recorded **83,536** encounters between ports of entry along the southwest border. These Border Patrol encounters were 29% lower than in May 2024 and were the lowest monthly total for the Border Patrol along the southwest border since January 2021. Total southwest border irregular encounters in June, including individuals who presented at ports of entry without a CBP One appointment, were **88,612**, a 30% decrease from May 2024. **This is CBP's lowest monthly southwest border encounter total since January 2021**. From May to June, the total number of individuals encountered along the southwest border between ports of entry and at ports of entry without a CBP appointment decreased across all demographics: encounters of unaccompanied children decreased **14**%, single adult encounters decreased **28**%, and family unit individual encounters decreased by **36**%.

The number of unaccompanied children encountered by CBP along the southwest border in June 2024, including individuals who presented at ports of entry without a CBP One appointment, decreased 14% compared to May 2024, decreased 28% compared to May for single adults, and decreased 36% for family unit individuals.

The United States is working together with our domestic and foreign partners to jointly disrupt irregular migration across our borders and monitor emerging threats, including public safety concerns posed by transnational criminal organizations. We continue to conduct thorough screening and vetting for all individuals that we encounter on the southern border to identify anyone affiliated with these organizations. For example, DHS

has implemented enhanced screening measures at the border to identify gang members who are detained for criminal prosecution or placement in Expedited Removal.

CBP continues to offer safe, orderly, and lawful pathways for intending migrants and, with our international partners, we are taking actions against ruthless smugglers who continue to spread falsehoods and show disregard for the safety and well-being of vulnerable migrants. Our message for anyone who is thinking of entering the United States unlawfully along the southern border is simple: don't do it. When migrants cross the border unlawfully, they put their lives in peril. The terrain along the border is extreme, the summer heat is severe, and the miles of desert migrants must hike after crossing the border in many areas are often deadly. People who made the dangerous journey into this territory have died of dehydration, starvation, and heat stroke. Smuggling organizations abandon migrants in remote and dangerous areas.

The U.S. Border Patrol has undertaken significant efforts in recent years to expand capacity to aid and rescue individuals in distress. To prevent the loss of life, CBP initiated a Missing Migrant Program in 2017 that locates noncitizens reported missing, rescues individuals in distress, and reunifies decedents' remains with their families in the border region. In June, the U.S. Border Patrol conducted **461** rescues, bringing the <u>FY 2024</u> total to **4,068** rescues.

CBP One™ App

The CBP One[™] mobile application is a key scheduling tool and part of DHS's efforts to incentivize noncitizens to use lawful, safe, humane, and orderly pathways and processes. Noncitizens who cross between the ports of entry or who present themselves at a port of entry without making a CBP One[™] appointment are generally subject to the interim final rule that, consistent with the Presidential Proclamation, restricts asylum eligibility for those who irregularly enter across the southwest land and the southern coastal borders. DHS encourages migrants to utilize lawful processes, rather than taking the dangerous journey to cross unlawfully between the ports of entry, which also carries significant consequences under the United States immigration laws.

Use of the CBP One[™] app to schedule appointments at ports of entry has increased CBP's capacity to process migrants in a more efficient and orderly manner while cutting out unscrupulous smugglers who endanger and profit from vulnerable migrants. The suspension and limitation on entry and interim final rule does not apply to noncitizens who use the CBP OneTM mobile app to enter the United States at a port of entry in a safe and orderly manner to avail themselves to lawful processes.

In June, CBP processed over **41,800** individuals through appointments at ports of entry utilizing advanced information submitted through CBP One[™]. Since the appointment scheduling function in CBP One[™] was introduced in January 2023 through the end of June 2024, more than **680,500** individuals have successfully scheduled appointments to present at ports of entry instead of risking their lives in the hands of smugglers. The top nationalities processed subsequent to arrival for their appointment are Venezuelan, Cuban, and Haitian.

A percentage of daily available appointments are allocated to the earliest registered CBP

One[™] profiles, so noncitizens who have been trying to obtain appointments for the longest time are prioritized. CBP is continually monitoring and evaluating the application to ensure its functionality and guard against bad actors.

CHNV Parole Processes

On January 5, 2023, DHS announced processes providing certain Cubans, Haitians, and Nicaraguans who have a supporter in the United States, undergo and clear robust security vetting and meet other eligibility criteria authorization to travel to the United States in a safe, orderly, and lawful way once they purchase their own commercial airline tickets. These processes were built on the success of the process for Venezuelans established in October 2022; they are publicly available online, and DHS has been providing regular updates on their use to the public. This is part of the Administration's strategy to combine expanded lawful pathways with stronger consequences to reduce irregular migration. These processes have kept hundreds of thousands of people from migrating irregularly, often at the hands of smuggling networks.

Through the end of June 2024, about 494,799 Cubans, Haitians, Nicaraguans, and Venezuelans arrived lawfully on commercial flights and were granted parole under these processes. Specifically, 106,757 Cubans, 205,026 Haitians, 93,325 Nicaraguans, and 118,706 Venezuelans were vetted and authorized for travel; and 104,130 Cubans, 194,027 Haitians, 86,101 Nicaraguans, and 110,541 Venezuelans arrived lawfully and were granted parole.

Safeguarding Communities by Interdicting Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs

As the largest law enforcement agency in the United States, CBP is uniquely positioned to detect, identify, and seize illicit drugs before they enter our communities. CBP's combination of interdiction and intelligence capabilities, complemented by its border search authorities, scientific services, non-intrusive inspection equipment, and canine detection teams, places it at the forefront of the U.S. government's efforts to combat illicit fentanyl and other dangerous drugs.

Earlier this year, CBP announced an expanded, multi-agency effort to target transnational criminals funneling fentanyl from Mexico into American communities. Operation Plaza Spike targets the cartels that facilitate the flow of deadly fentanyl, as well as its analogs, precursors, and tools to make the drugs. The operation is designed to disrupt operations in the "plazas," cartel territories located directly south of the United States that are natural logistical chokepoints within the cartels' operations. This is the next phase in CBP's Strategy to Combat Fentanyl and Other Synthetic Drugs, a whole-of-government and international effort to anticipate, identify, mitigate, and disrupt illicit synthetic drug producers, suppliers, and traffickers.

That strategy also includes conducting operations, including Operation Apollo, that target the smuggling of illicit fentanyl and other dangerous drugs. First implemented in southern California in October 2023, and recently expanded into Arizona, Operation Apollo utilizes local field assets augmented by federal, state, local, tribal, and territorial partners to target drug traffickers' supply chains in select locations based on ongoing investigations,

intelligence collection, and drug seizure data. Operation Apollo targets items required in the production of illicit fentanyl, including precursor chemicals, pill presses and parts, movement of finished product, and illicit proceeds.

Nationwide in June, seizures of cocaine, methamphetamine, heroin, fentanyl, and marijuana combined by weight decreased by 17% compared to May. In June, nationwide heroin seizures increased by 47% compared with May, and seizures of cocaine increased by 13%. To date in FY 2024 through the end of June, CBP has seized **over** 15,000 pounds of fentanyl. CBP has caught more fentanyl nationwide between the start of fiscal year 2023 through June 30, 2024, than in the previous eight fiscal years combined, and we continue to optimize our intelligence and field operations to stop these deadly substances from reaching American communities.

Facilitating Lawful Trade and Travel

As international travel continues to increase, CBP is leveraging technology to streamline efficiency and increase security at air and land ports of entry. Travelers are encouraged to utilize CBP's mobile apps to enhance their travel experience, including the <u>Global Entry Mobile Application</u> and <u>Mobile Passport Control</u>, as well as new <u>Global Entry Touchless Portals</u> at nearly all international airports across the United States, which protect passenger privacy and expedite arrival processing by eliminating paper receipts.

Travelers arriving by air into the United States increased 11% from June 2023 to June 2024; pedestrians arriving by land at ports of entry increased 4% over the same period; passenger vehicles processed at ports of entry increased 2.5%; and commercial trucks processed at ports of entry decreased 4.4%.

CBP works diligently with the trade community and port operators to ensure that merchandise is cleared as efficiently as possible and to strengthen international supply chains and improve border security. In June 2024, CBP processed more than **2.8 million** entry summaries valued at more than **\$272.1 billion**, identifying estimated duties of nearly **\$6.7 billion** to be collected by the U.S. government. In June, trade via the ocean environment accounted for **42.2%** of the total import value, followed by air, truck, and rail.

Protecting Consumers, Eradicating Forced Labor from Supply Chains, and Promoting Economic Security

CBP continues to lead U.S. government efforts to eliminate goods from the supply chain made with forced labor from the Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region of China. In June, CBP stopped **291** shipments valued at more than **\$39 million** for further examination based on the suspected use of forced labor.

Intellectual property rights violations continue to put America's innovation economy at risk. Counterfeit and pirated goods threaten the competitiveness of U.S. businesses, the livelihoods of American workers, and the health and safety of consumers.

Consumers are encouraged to be alert to the dangers of counterfeit goods especially when shopping online as they support criminal activity, hurt American businesses, and often have materials or ingredients that can pose serious health and safety risks. Every year CBP seizes millions of counterfeit products worth billions of dollars had they been genuine. In June, CBP seized **1,501** shipments that contained counterfeit goods valued at more than **\$395 million**. More information about CBP's intellectual property rights enforcement is available at https://www.cbp.gov/trade.

CBP completed **19** audits in June that identified **\$9 million** in duties and fees owed to the U.S. government, stemming from goods that had been improperly declared in accordance with U.S. trade laws and customs regulations. CBP collected over **\$2.3 million** of this identified revenue and from previous fiscal years' assignments.

CBP is on the frontline of textiles and trade agreements enforcement, combating textile imports that are not compliant with U.S. trade laws. Protecting the domestic textile industry and American consumers is vital to U.S. national security, health care, and economic priorities. Toward this end, CBP is intensifying its targeting and enforcement efforts to increase and expedite the prosecution of illegal customs practices. CBP's efforts include de minimis compliance, forced labor enforcement, cargo compliance, regulatory audits, and public awareness. In April, DHS announced an enhanced strategy to combat illicit trade and level the playing field for the American textile industry, which accounts for over 500,000 U.S. jobs and is critical for our national security. The plan details the actions CBP and Homeland Security Investigations will take to hold perpetrators accountable for customs violations and safeguard the American textile industry.

Defending our Nation's Agricultural System

Through targeting, detection, and interception, CBP agriculture specialists work to prevent threats from entering the United States.

CBP issued **6,818** emergency action notifications for restricted and prohibited plant and animal products entering the United States in June 2024. CBP conducted **106,495** positive passenger inspections and issued **702** civil penalties and/or violations to the traveling public for failing to declare prohibited agriculture items.

Colorado: Gov. Polis Denies Migrants' 'Apartment Complex Takeover' Despite Video Evidence, Police Reports, And Mayor's Confirmation

Despite video evidence, police reports, and the city's mayor verifying the situation, Democrat Colorado Gov. Jared Polis dismissed outrage over the Venezuelan gang Tren de Aragua occupying apartment buildings in the Aurora suburb of Denver, calling it "imagination."

In reaction to Aurora City Councilwoman Danielle Jurinsky, who told reported that the gang takeovers are connected to Polis's policies, Polis's press office sent the caustic comment on Wednesday night.

"The Governor has already let the Mayor know that the State is ready to support the local police department with assistance from state troopers and the Colorado Bureau of Investigation if needed," said Shelby Wieman, a spokesperson for the Democratic governor. "But, according to police intelligence this purported invasion is largely a feature of Danielle Jurinsky's imagination."

Fox Denver surveillance footage on Wednesday night showed what appeared to be an armed group of men—later identified by law enforcement as members of Tren de Aragua—walking through an Aurora apartment complex brandishing weapons.

Tenants maintained that the complex had been taken over by the gang.

Just before a gunfire broke out at the troublesome residential area, injuring one person seriously, three of the men were observed entering the building with more handguns, while the other held a rifle.

Furthermore, "there are several buildings" in Aurora that have "fallen to these Venezuelan gangs," according to Mayor Mike Coffman, who spoke with *Fox News* on Thursday.

Denver, a sanctuary city located just west of Aurora, is the nation's city with the highest per capita immigration rate; the majority of these migrants are from Venezuela. Since December 2022, almost 40,000 migrants have come there to live.

The apartment investor, who did not give permission for his name to be identified, told the *New York Post* outlet that because the gang has taken over many units, they have "lost control" of multiple buildings in the area.

"They were first hanging out around the property and creating a bad element that's constantly there. And then they started taking over, quite a few months ago, they started taking over vacant units," he said.

Gov. Polis has consistently supported Colorado's sanetuary policy throughout the whole ordeal in addition to acting like nothing negative is happening.

In order to facilitate their new life in the state, the governor has recently signed legislation that would make it simpler for illegal aliens to get driver's licenses, enroll in classes, and access government-funded facilities.

Polis decided to begin busing migrants to New York City in 2023 when the number of migrants became too great, however, the program has since been discontinued.

Nevertheless, a large number of people remained, and some even relocated to the 390,000-person Aurora neighborhood, where the gang currently controls a number of flats.

"It's been a nightmare and I can't wait to get out of here," said apartment resident Cindy Romero, who spoke with Fox Denver as she began moving out of the building.

The group, which is from the Aragua region of Venezuela, has been transporting members over the US-Mexico border under the Harris and Biden administration.
