

DRIVING THE DAY

— Audacy under the microscope: A big-ticket radio deal that's been spooking Republicans (largely due to the involvement of billionaire and far-right boogeyman George Soros) is now set for a vote at the Federal Communications Commission, after Sen. <u>Ted Cruz</u> (R-Texas) successfully pressured FCC

leadership to dig into concerns raised by the restructuring.

TECH OF THE TOWN

FIRST IN MT: MORE SCRUTINY FOR AUDACY RADIO SHAKE-UP —

Republican lawmakers worried about the influence of their least favorite liberal billionaire have successfully pressured the Federal Communications Commission to more carefully review the reorganization of one of the country's biggest radio broadcasters.

Ahead of plans to more widely announce later today, the office of Senate Commerce ranking member Ted Cruz (R-Texas) told John that FCC commissioners will now hold a vote on the rejiggering of radio broadcaster Audacy instead of letting it be considered at the staff level, with Cruz staff citing their own intel from FCC officials.

It's a win for Republicans concerned about the power that Audacy's restructuring would give to left-leaning billionaire George Soros over scores of radio stations — and their millions of listeners — ahead of November's elections. The billionaire has sunk vast amounts of money into liberal and progressive causes, and sits at the center of a <u>dizzying array of conspiracy theories</u> peddled by the far-right (and sometimes, Republican lawmakers).

The expected commission vote appears to be a change of heart for Rosenworcel, who in late April told Congress that "Bureau staff will review the record and decide if the transfer is in the public interest."

"I am very pleased that Chairwoman [Jessica] Rosenworcel has come to her senses and abandoned her plan to have unaccountable bureaucrats rubberstamp George Soros's takeover of Audacy," Cruz said in a statement shared with John.

A Rosenworcel spokesperson declined to comment on Cruz's characterization, citing longstanding FCC policy around pending transactions.

— Lots of ears at stake: Audacy owns more than 200 radio stations, making it the second-largest radio broadcaster in the country and giving it significant reach (and, potentially, political sway). But the Philadelphia-based company declared bankruptcy early this year, prompting Soros Fund Management to step in. The deal would save Audacy financially while making the Soros group its largest shareholder.

First, however, the reorg has to receive FCC approval due to its reshuffling of broadcast licenses. And while Audacy already laid out its <u>proposed changes</u> in applications before the commission earlier this year, Republican lawmakers have called for tighter scrutiny.

In April, Rep. Chip Roy (R-Texas) said the plans should be "subject to rigorous FCC oversight to ensure U.S. radio stations are not subject to undue influence" and include "a full review of the foreign ownership interests as required by the law" rather than temporarily putting off such vetting as Audacy requests (the deal, Audacy notes, will put it over the current foreign ownership limits). Rep. Nick Langworthy (R-N.Y.) offered similar concerns, telling the FCC that same month that the sale "is the latest in a series of moves by a partisan, progressive billionaire to consolidate control over the media and flood hundreds of local radio stations with far-left ideology and propaganda."

— **GOP fears the rubber stamp:** Many FCC matters can be handled by bureau staff without coming before the full commission for a vote — though the decision is always at the chair's discretion.

But in this case, Republicans say kicking the Audacy decision to FCC staff would sidestep much-needed scrutiny, especially given some temporary waivers involved over foreign ownership (senior GOP Commissioner Brendan Carr warned in June against any "Soros shortcut" for Audacy).

The FCC has approved similar radio bankruptcy restructuring plans in the past, including <u>staff-level sign-off</u> of plans from iHeart Media during the Trump

years. But these procedural calculations are a sensitive topic for Cruz, who <u>was</u> <u>enraged</u> last year to see Rosenworcel <u>avoid a full commission vote</u> in the FCC's review of the Standard General-Tegna broadcast TV merger. A bureau-level decision ultimately spelled the death of that deal.

— **Cruz takes the dial**: Cruz repeatedly <u>pressed the FCC's</u> two <u>Democratic</u> <u>commissioners</u> as well as <u>both Republicans</u> on Audacy this summer, saying the commissioners needed to cast votes on the restructuring instead of relying on staff review. In his new statement, Cruz credits the two GOP commissioners with helping secure a full vote, which is now apparently pending (details of proposed circulating orders aren't public).

"Considering the significance of the matter at stake — a request for a waiver of statutory foreign ownership limits to transfer Audacy's hundreds of broadcast licenses to new owners in the run-up to the Presidential election — I have repeatedly said that a full Commission vote is both a basic duty of the FCC commissioners and necessary to protect the interests of the American public," the Texas Republican said. Cruz added that he's "grateful to Commissioners Carr and Simington for working with me to bring greater transparency and accountability to the federal bureaucracy."

— Why so worried? Audacy has strenuously denied that it would receive any special treatment as part of the FCC's approval process. The broadcaster defended its plans in a <u>May regulatory filing</u>, criticizing "ill-informed" attacks from the conservative Media Research Center and describing its proposed restructuring as "fully consistent" with FCC precedent.

"Audacy's prompt emergence from bankruptcy, with substantially less debt and improved operational arrangements, is critical to the continued operations of its stations and its ability to remain a competitive radio broadcaster," the company told the FCC at the time.

Audacy spokespeople didn't respond to a request for comment about the FCC review or Cruz's recent characterizations of the transaction.

— **Clock's ticking:** Audacy <u>voiced fresh financial anxiety</u> this week around the delayed approval of its restructuring — a reorganization that is now likely to be even further delayed as the review moves to the commissioners themselves.

And on Wednesday night, Carr signaled he still has reservations about the planned restructuring. He told John he's concerned the parties are seeking a "new and special shortcut" by seeking a temporary and limited waiver of the foreign ownership limits in their plans, rather than going through the commission's process for reviewing these matters.

"My position is pretty simple: I think the Commission should follow the rules and processes that it codified in federal law," Carr said. "Is there something unique about these parties to this transaction that merit unprecedented Commission-level relief?"

Audacy, however, worries that would be too time-consuming. In its plans, Audacy warned the FCC that "deferring the company's emergence from bankruptcy pending a lengthy foreign ownership review would require substantial delay that would imperil Audacy's restructuring and otherwise frustrate the Commission's policy of accommodating the policies of the federal bankruptcy laws."

THE CONTENT WARS

THORN SHEDS LIGHT ON KIDS' CHANGING ONLINE EXPERIENCE —

Roughly 1 in 10 minors say they know peers who have used generative artificial intelligence tools to create nonconsensual intimate images of other minors, per a report released on Wednesday from Thorn, the anti-human trafficking group that advocates for legislation that would boost protections for kids online.

The report — which details findings from a survey of 1,040 minors ages 9-17 that was conducted online from Nov. 3 to Dec. 1, 2023 — also found that the number of kids experiencing harmful interactions online, such as bullying and sexual encounters, continues to increase from Thorn's previous findings in 2020 and 2022.

The report comes as Capitol Hill struggles to pass laws that would strengthen safety and privacy protections for kids online.

— What Congress has cooking: Lawmakers in Washington are faced with a plethora of kids' online safety bills — most notably the <u>Kids Online Safety and</u>

Privacy Act, a mashup of the <u>Kids Online Safety Act</u> and the <u>Children and Teens'</u> Online Privacy Protection Act. KOSPA prohibits companies from targeting minors with ads and limits the amount of data that platforms can collect on users younger than 17. While the Senate <u>passed KOSPA in late July</u>, the measure may struggle to get through the House.

Other kids' online safety bills include the <u>Kids Off Social Media Act</u>, which would prohibit people under age 13 from using social media. There's also a handful focused on broadly combating AI-generated nonconsensual intimate images, such as the <u>TAKE IT DOWN Act</u>, the <u>DEFIANCE Act</u> and the <u>Intimate Privacy Protection Act</u>. The TAKE IT DOWN Act <u>advanced out of the Senate Commerce Committee in July</u>, but the other bills have yet to progress in Congress.

In a Wednesday interview with MT, Emily Slifer, Thorn's director of policy, said that in order to pass laws protecting kids online, lawmakers need to "pick and choose the parts that people can agree on and get smaller pieces of legislation through, as opposed to trying to do these giant holistic bills." She said those key pieces should include duty of care provisions (which requires platforms to take steps to prevent harm) and "safety by design" mandates (requiring platforms to design their products with kids' safety in mind, such as defaulting to maximum privacy settings for underage users).

KOSPA has a duty of care requirement that industry and some civil rights advocacy groups have opposed, given its potential application to content that may not be harmful. Progressive tech groups like Fight for the Future have raised concerns that a future Federal Trade Commission — which would be empowered to determine what content is considered harmful — could use the bill to "pressure platforms into automated filtering of important but controversial topics like LGBTQ issues and abortion." Those groups have advocated for a duty of care provision that is explicitly "content neutral."

— **States to the rescue?** State legislatures have moved to fill the gap left by Washington on kids' online safety, specifically with <u>measures targeting social</u> media platforms' design and imposing duty of care requirements on companies.

But many of those laws have either been halted by the courts or tangled up in lawsuits brought by the tech industry, which <u>has argued that laws like</u>

California's Age-Appropriate Design Code violate the First Amendment.

Slifer told MT that a patchwork of state laws is not the right approach. "It's going to become harder and harder to implement and enforce across the states if there's not an overarching piece of federal regulation," she said.

ON THE HILL

HOUSE E&C DEMS PRAISE FCC'S AI MOVE — House Energy and Commerce ranking member Frank Pallone (D-N.J.) and Democrats on the Communications and Technology Subcommittee sent a letter on Wednesday to Rosenworcel, endorsing the agency's move to open a rulemaking to require the disclosure of AI in campaign ads (despite GOP objections).

"While we understand that it may not be possible to enact these new rules prior to the November election, these rules will only become more important for future elections," the lawmakers wrote. They encouraged Rosenworcel to "complete this rulemaking expeditiously."

- FCC leapfrogs the Hill: Congress had a chance just before the August recess to advance rules regulating the use of AI in political ads, when Sen. Amy Klobuchar (D-Minn.) tried to get her Protect Elections from Deceptive AI Act and AI Transparency in Elections Act through the Senate via unanimous consent (it didn't work). The lack of action from Congress has led federal agencies (like the FCC) and state legislatures to fill the gap.
- **Eyes on the FEC:** The Federal Election Commission <u>took up a petition</u> from the consumer advocacy group Public Citizen last August, asking it to issue new rules clarifying that <u>existing campaign law</u> on fraudulent misrepresentation applies to AI. A public comment period on the matter closed in October, and the agency hasn't acted on it since.

Axios reported last week that the FEC would not propose new rules on AI before the election. But on Wednesday, Democratic Commissioner Ellen Weintraub posted on X that the petition for rulemaking on AI in campaign ads "will be back on the agenda" at the agency's Aug. 29 meeting.

DHS data: The Department of Homeland Security plans to collect and analyze photos of migrant children's faces at the border in an effort to improve facial recognition technology, <u>MIT Technology Review reports</u>.

WOW! In Play: WideOpenWest said Friday it received a surprise bid from DigitalBridge Investments and Crestview Partners to buy out the company at \$4.80 a share, giving WOW! a valuation of \$400 million. Crestview already owns 38% of WOW! shares, which it will contribute to the equity portion of the deal. The WOW! Board of Directors intends to establish a special committee of independent directors to evaluate the proposal, which WOW! described as an unsolicited non-binding preliminary proposal. "We believe that our proposal represents a highly attractive value for the company's shareholders relative to recent trading. The \$4.80 per share price represents a 32% premium over WOW's closing price as of May 1, 2024 and [a] 44% premium to the company's 60-day [volume-weighted average price]," DigitalBridge Managing Director Jonathan Friesel said in a May 2 letter to the WOW! board. With headquarters in Boca Raton, Fl., DigitalBridge is led by

CEO Marc C. Ganzi, who founded and grew Global Tower Partners before selling to American Tower Corp. in 2013 for \$4.8 billion. "DigitalBridge manages an \$80 billion portfolio of digital infrastructure assets on behalf of its limited partners and shareholders and has relevant experience to, and is very familiar with, WOW," Friesel's letter added. Friesel said the two suitors "will not move forward with our proposal unless it is recommended by the special committee and approved by the company's board of directors." DigitalBridge and Crestview engaged LionTree Advisors to advise on the deal.

LionTree CEO Aryeh B. Bourkoff is a dealmaker known for having contacts in the top echelons of the media and telecom sectors. Crestview Partners' leadership includes Vice Chairman and cable industry veteran Jeff Marcus, who in 1998 sold his namesake Marcus Cable for \$2.7 billion to Microsoft co-founder Paul **Allen.** The buyout offer likely represents a distressing finale for long-term WOW! shareholders. In 2021, WOW! sold cable systems mostly in the Midwest to Breezeline (then called Atlantic Broadband) and Astound Broadband for \$1.8 billion, pushing the stock to almost \$24 a share. Last November after reporting third quarter earnings, WOW! stock lost 61% of its value in one day after the company said it lost 4,400 broadband subscribers, with CEO Teresa Elder and CFO John **Rego** forecasting even worse numbers in the fourth quarter. Based in Englewood, Colo., WOW! ended 2023 with 490,100 broadband subscribers, a decrease of 21,500 compared to Dec. 31, 2022 and down 13,300 compared to Sept. 30, 2023. The company has \$934.5 million in debt. WOW! is transitioning away from the traditional cable TV business through a partnership formed a year ago with Google's YouTube TV, an online linear TV service. WOW! has about 90,800 cable TV subscribers remaining. WOW! is scheduled to report first quarter results tomorrow at 8:00 a.m.

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FWA: Fixed wireless access (FWA) providers added 879,000 subscribers combined in the first quarter, according to numbers reported by four publicly traded wireless carriers in recent weeks. UScellular was the last to report, saying on Friday it added 10,000 FWA subscribers in the quarter. "We have another strong quarter in fixed wireless. We've grown this subscriber base by 42% compared to the prior year, ending the quarter with 124,000 subscribers," UScellular President & CEO Laurent Therivel said on a call with Wall Street analysts. But Therivel dislosed that FWA isn't profitable. "Fixed wireless is a great business for us, but we've talked in the past about it's difficult to sustain fixed wireless. It doesn't pay for itself, right? It doesn't pay for the capital necessary. And so what we need to find is those other use cases that help to monetize 5G over and above just positive consumer net adds," he said. In the first quarter, T-Mobile added 405,000 FWA customers and Verizon added 354,000. Verizon actually broke out its FWA revenue for the first time, saying it was \$452 million in the first quarter, up \$197 million from the same period a year ago.



AT&T's FWA service called **AT&T Internet Air** is growing the fastest (admittedly off a small base) but **AT&T CEO John Stankey** says the company has a fiber-first outlook, adding that FWA does not have the capacity to serve a "single-family home that streams hours and hours of video a day," which prevents AT&T from putting its marketing muscle behind the service. "And I just don't see that as long-term sustainable or healthy growth of returns for the business. And I've been pretty consistent in saying that and I'm still consistent in saying that," Stankey told Wall Street on April 24. AT&T's outlook likely comes as good news to someone like **Charter CEO Christopher Winfrey**, who routinely refers to FWA as "cellphone Internet," "an inferior product, and "really just another form of DSL."

Glo-ing Results: Shentel reported first quarter results Friday, saying it added a record 5,000 Glo Fiber broadband subscribers and remained on track to reach

600,000 Glo Fiber passings by the end of 2026 with a terminal penetration rate of 38% after five years. "I would say the majority of our [Glo Fiber] ads are switching from one of the big cable providers," **Shentel EVP and COO Edward McKay** said on an earnings call with Wall Street analysts. Company revenue grew 3.1% to \$69.2 million versus the first quarter of 2023. Glo Fiber revenue grew 73.0% to \$12.1 million. Shentel reported a net loss of \$4.1 million from continuing operations in the quarter due primarily to higher interest expense. **McKay** said that 50% of new residential subscribers took speed tiers of 1 Gig or higher and 3% took speeds of 2 Gigs or higher.



"We continue to focus on providing the fastest speeds, the most reliable network and outstanding local customer service and our churn remained extremely low at 0.86% for the quarter," McKay said. He added that the company had relatively limited exposure – about 6,200 subscribers in all – to the **Affordable Connectivity Program** (ACP), which ran out of full funding on April 30. "Less than 4% of our total broadband data customers subscribe to ACP supported plans, and over 75% of them were customers prior to enrolling in the ACP program," he said. **Shentel CFO James Volk** said the company ended the first quarter with \$484 million in liquidity to fuel Glo Fiber expansion and net debt of \$190 million

Bulk Billing: Eleven House lawmakers – four of them Democrats – want the FCC to understand the full impact of Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel's proposal to ban bulk billing for Internet access in Multiple Dwelling Units (MDUs). "We are concerned that this proposal would harm seniors, fixed-income individuals, and students who reside on the premises of these arrangements. Therefore, we request that the FCC consider these factors when evaluating the Chairwoman's proposal," the lawmakers said in an April 3 letter to all five FCC Commissioners that was posted on the agency's website last Friday. The lawmakers said they feared the FCC was going to reverse its 2010 finding that bulk billing arrangements "predominately benefit consumers." They said the agency's prior decision is well-founded as it enables consumers, including seniors, fixed-income individuals, and students to aggregate their purchasing power. In an April 23 response, Rosenworcel said MDU consumers have complained to the FCC about being forced to pay "unwanted fees" for Internet

access. "I have proposed that we begin a rulemaking to allow consumers to simply opt-out of these arrangements," Rosenworcel said. Resistance to Rosenworcel's plan has been stiff, especially from public housing advocates and ISPs serving MDUs. The House Democrats on the letter were: Rep. Darren Soto of Florida, Rep. Jared Moskowitz of Florida, Rep. Kathy Castor of Florida, and Rep. Lizzie Fletcher of Texas.



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Quick Takes

TDS Telecom said last Friday it added 8,100 residential broadband subscribers in the first quarter, ending with 547,900 Internet customers. "We see strong broadband connection growth in our expansion markets. We also continue to see incumbent copper customers convert to fiber where available, protecting our base and providing a better customer experience," said TDS SVP of Finance and CFO Michelle Brukwicki. Asked by Michael Rollins of Citi Research if TDS planned to experiment with an open access model, Brukwicki said although the company works with wireless and tower companies, it is not considering "opening it up and being a wholesale provider. That's not where we're going with these at this point." Last year, AT&T and asset management giant BlackRock formed the Gigapower fiber joint venture to deploy a commercial wholesale open access platform in a few metro areas.

Taylor Telephone Cooperative in Merkel, Texas is informing the FCC about an unusual broadband deployment problem. For some reason, the company with 9,600 broadband customers is obligated to spend \$5,466 in RDOF support over 10 years to deploy broadband in two Census Block Groups that have zero serviceable locations. "Under current rules, if Taylor defaulted by 'returning' the two phantom locations, the company would be prohibited from participating in any future auctions and would have penalties imposed," the company said in a May 2 letter to the FCC. The company asked for a waiver from the requirement to build out to 40% of the "phantom" locations "until the [Wireline Competition] Bureau establishes the updated location counts based on the Broadband Data Collection, which will show zero obligations." In a previous filing, Taylor noted, "With no serviceable locations, there is nowhere to deploy the service."

Rep. Chip Roy (R-Texas) is pressuring the FCC to take a close look at Soros Fund Management's acquisition of over \$400 million in debt held by Audacy – the second-largest broadcast radio station owner in the country – en route to becoming Audacy's largest shareholder. "The FCC's review of this Soros transaction will naturally draw close public scrutiny," Roy said, pointing to potential foreign ownership violations. On April 25, FCC Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel in her reply to Roy noted that the conservative Media Research Center filed a petition to deny the transaction. She said the Media Bureau will decide the matter.

On Friday, the National Religious Broadcasters (NRB) and the American Family Association (AFA), said they are suing the FCC over the reinstatement of Form 395-B after 20 years of disuse. Form 395-B requires broadcasters to collect employee data on race, ethnicity, and gender and post the data on the FCC-hosted online public inspection file. NRB and AFA said Form 395-B exceeds the FCC's statutory authority, violates the equal protection component of the Fifth Amendment and the Free Speech Clause of the First Amendment, and is an abuse of the FCC's discretion. Data in the form, NRB and AFA said, "will not be de-identified or kept private by the [FCC], opening the door to third-party weaponization of the public file to target specific broadcast stations."





FCC Fine: Nexstar Media Group, the largest TV station owner in the country, is fighting a \$1.2 million fine levied last month by the FCC for allegedly usurping control of TV station WPIX in New York City and in the process exceeding a federal law that caps a TV station owner's national reach. Nexstar, in an FCC filing sent to reporters yesterday, demanded that the FCC cancel the fine and other penalties, claiming the agency violated federal law and the Constitution in wielding "its enforcement authority in a myriad of improper ways." The FCC proposed the big fine after concluding that Nexstar effectively acquired WPIX from Mission

Broadcasting without seeking FCC consent. Nexstar's action, the FCC said, put the broadcaster six percentage points over the national cap. In terms of options, the FCC said Nexstar could acquire WPIX with agency approval provided it divested a

sufficient number of TV stations to comply with the 39% cap. Nexstar also has the option to divest WPIX to a third party not Mission. Mission was also fined \$612,395. Nexstar said the FCC's "analysis and penalties contradict existing FCC rules and authority, contravene the Communications Act and the Administrative Procedure Act, and violate Nexstar's constitutional rights in multiple respects." Nexstar, based in Irving, Texas, said the FCC blessed its relationship with Mission when Mission acquired WPIX in 2020 from E.W. Scripps Co. in a deal that went unopposed. "Nonetheless, the [FCC] throughout the [fine order] finds fault with Nexstar's performance of duties that the FCC-approved [Local Programming and Marketing Agreement] expressly places upon Nexstar," Nexstar said. The broadcaster said the FCC's standards applied to Nexstar are unconstitutionally vague and the required divestiture of WPIX or the stations is likely impermissible under the Takings Clause of the Fifth Amendment.

FWA: Verizon Communications added 354,000 Fixed Wireless Access (FWA) subscribers in the first quarter, evidence of a slowdown that cable broadband ISPs said was coming. In the prior quarter, Verizon added 375,000 FWA subscribers. "We continue to be comfortable with this pace of growth, believing it provides the right combination of base growth, ARPU [average revenue per user] accretion and the superior experience that our customers expect on the Verizon network," Verizon EVP and CFO Tony Skiadas said. Verizon said it added 203,000 residential and 151,000 business FWA subscribers in the quarter, saying the business segment's 10.2% increase over first quarter 2023 was its best quarterly result to date. The company has 3.4 million FWA subscribers. Verizon ended the quarter with 11.1 million broadband subscribers. The company has added more that 3 million broadband subscribers over the past two years, cutting into the growth of wireline broadband ISPs such as Comcast Corp. and Charter Communications. "This reflects the attractiveness of FWA as an alternative to traditional cable broadband, even in a market that saw muted activity," Skiadas said.



MoffettNathanson, an independent equity research firm, said in a client memo

Monday that Verizon's FWA results "remain a puzzle" and continue to lag FWA rival **T-Mobile**. "Growth is still relatively strong, but their quarterly results continue to decelerate, something we wouldn't have expected given the early stage of deployment and the steady expansion of their Band 76 C-Band footprints. Their results have never approached those of T-Mobile, particularly in the consumer segment," MoffettNathanson said. Verizon added 53,000 Fios subscribers, the same as in the previous quarter. "We're pleased at how Fios continues to grow in the marketplace, even as move activity across the country remains lower than prior years," Skiadas said.

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National Security: Seth Cooper, Director of Policy Studies and Senior Fellow at the Free State Foundation, issued a paper yesterday casting strong doubt on the FCC's decision to rely on national security and public safety concerns to justify Net Neutrality under Title II of the Communications Act. In Cooper's view, the timing of this "rebranding" seems suspicious. "Why did [FCC Chairwoman Jessica] Rosenworcel never bring safety and security concerns to Congress and why did she wait until two-and-a-half years into her tenure as the head of the agency before raising them in a rulemaking about imposing public utility regulation on broadband services?" Cooper said. In the Net Neutrality draft order, the FCC said Title II would empower it to shield the country from Chinese Communist Party-related foreign entities participating in the U.S. market. Citing Republican FCC Commissioner Brendan Carr, Cooper said, "The Biden Administration already has the authority to prohibit those entities from continuing to operate in the U.S." Cooper added the FCC will run into trouble in court because Congress has not authorized its Net Neutrality rules. "It is quite unlikely that the agency's superficial national security and public

safety rationale for public utility regulation of broadband networks will save the Biden FCC's Internet regulation plan from being struck down under the **Major Questions Doctrine**," Cooper said. The Major Questions Doctrine bars the FCC from adopting regulations of "vast economic and political significance" without clear authorization by Congress.

Small ISP Exemption: Brett Glass, who operates the LARIAT WISP in Laramie, Wyoming, is calling on the FCC to exempt small ISPs from the pending Net Neutrality regulations, but he did not specify a definition of small. WISPA – The Association for Broadband Without Boundaries has asked for an immediate exemption from all the rules on a temporary basis that would include all ISPs with 250,000 subscribers or fewer, a threshold which would presumably cover LARIAT and just about every ISP in the country except for the industry's giants. Glass said an exemption is appropriate because the FCC's "vague" General Conduct rule will drive away investors and the transparency rules "could reveal commercially sensitive information about our business operations and future plans, enabling anticompetitive actions by large competitors that could harm or even destroy our small business." Glass added that in his opinion the FCC's rules also "violate the provisions of the Regulatory Flexibility Act if applied to small businesses such as LARIAT." Glass expressed his concerns in an Microsoft Teams call on April 17 with Hayley Steffen, Legal Advisor to Commissioner Gomez.

Weiss Ratings: In March, the FCC said that for at least one year, it would not penalize RDOF reverse auction winners that had obtained letters of credit (LOCs) from banks that had seen their Weiss rating drop below B-minus. The FCC's rules stipulated that a Weiss rating below B-minus required suspension of RDOF support until the auction winner found a new bank with a Weiss rating of at least B minus. Gavin Magor, Director of Research & Ratings at Weiss Ratings, told Policyband yesterday that the communications industry "should not be concerned that they will find difficulty in locating a bank holding a Weiss rating sufficient to meet the requirements of the FCC. At the present time, eight of the ten largest banks and 1,581 small banks with under \$2 billion in assets hold a rating at or better than the

minimum standard of B minus." Magor also responded to the **Bank Policy Institute**, which placed a <u>letter</u> in the FCC record that included a highly negative critique of Weiss's credibility and reliability. "We vehemently disagree with the deliberate mischaracterization by the Bank Policy Institute, a lobbying group that represents the forty largest banks in the U.S., over the ability of Weiss to issue accurate bank ratings. Weiss has been rating banks since 1973. Unlike the traditional rating, paid for by the requesting bank, our ratings are issued independent of a bank's desire for a rating and are based on proprietary modeling using the data filed by the banks with the regulator," Magor said. **BPI spokesman Sean Oblack** declined to comment.

Radio Deal: L. Brent Bozell III, President & Founder of the Media Research Center (MRC), yesterday filed a petition with the FCC to deny or delay a major radio station deal. According to MRC, the deal would result in the Soros Fund Management, a firm founded by activist billionaire George Soros, to become the largest shareholder in bankrupt broadcaster Audacy, which owns the second largest number of broadcast radio stations in the country. "There is no question that George Soros and his affiliated businesses are looking to control these radio stations to advance their particular brand of activism," Bozell's four-page petition said.

According to MRC, the radio deal involves 225 stations in 46 markets. MRC said the FCC had an obligation to take a close look at the deal because "the Soros group expressly states in their FCC filing that they have determined that the aggregate level of foreign ownership in the company when it emerges from bankruptcy will exceed the 25% limit" in federal regulations. "The Communications Act does not contain a special Soros shortcut," Bozell's petition said. The MRC, based in Herndon, Va., is a conservative media watchdog group that has been tracking media bias since 1987.

Quick Takes

Broadband Connectivity measurement firm **Ookla** in Seattle has developed an **Application Programming Interface (API)** that, "in cooperation with a service provider, can enrich Speedtest records with enhanced details such as network technology (i.e. fiber, cable, wireless,DSL) as well as subscriber tier." **Ookla VP of Government Affairs David Darr** made the disclosure during an April 19 <u>video conference</u> with FCC officials **Wesley Platt, Mika Savir and Zac Champ**. "This test record enrichment can provide direct correlations to provider claims on the Broadband Consumer Labels and what is actually delivered to the service address,"

Darr said. In other comments, Darr noted that the labels include "typical" download and upload speeds but what the "consumer may experience on their own equipment can be significantly different from the service delivered due to variations in consumer equipment, behavior, and venue." Darr added, "Both delivered network performance and actual consumer experience are important for regulators and service providers to understand to continue improving connectivity to the public."

The FCC yesterday <u>launched</u> its biennial *Communications Marketplace Report* that will assess the state of competition in the delivery of voice, video, audio, and data services among providers of telecommunications, providers of commercial mobile service, MVPDs, broadcast stations, providers of satellite communications, Internet service providers, and other providers of communications services. The report also will assess whether laws or regulations pose a barrier to competitive entry into the communications marketplace. Comments are due on **June 6** and reply comments on **July 8**.

Cable's New Take On Bulk Billing Network Slicing Splits ISPs Will ACP Come With ETFs? DWT on All-In Pricing Deadlines

BEAD: Shentel, a fiber-first broadband provider available to about 450,000 mid-Atlantic locations, is likely going to pass on accepting funding under the Commerce Department's \$42.4 billion Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) program, the Biden Administration's signature effort to ensure broadband Internet for all. Shentel's EVP and COO Ed McKay said state programs and American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding were a better fit. "We are not as excited about the BEAD program. With the state grants with the ARPA funds, there were fewer strings attached than what we expect to see with BEAD," McKay said at a New Street Research (NSR) conference last Friday. BEAD regulations, he said, would likely be the cause for keeping the company away. "We're going to be hesitant to be a big player in BEAD if there are mandates on labor rates and mandates on pricing. We're also worried about some of the onerous reporting requirements." If Shentel does

accept BEAD money, it won't be much. "We are watching to see what happens, but with what we've heard so far, we're likely not a big player in BEAD," McKay said. At the same conference, **Jim Butman**, **President and CEO of TDS** in Wisconsin, indicated his agreement with McKay. TDS has federal funding lined up for many years to serve areas that will not be eligible for BEAD money. Other industry leaders have raised concerns about BEAD regulations. Last year, **Charter CEO Christopher Winfrey** said, "I want to reiterate and be very clear that where state BEAD rules are not conducive to private investment, we will not participate in those states." In a client note after the conference, **NSR's Jonathan Chaplin** wrote, "Some of the smaller operators like TDS and Shentel have lost interest in BEAD given the **red tape** and **heavy-handed** regulation."

Upgrade to paic

Bulk Billing: Cable operators – in defending their reliance on bulk billing for communications services in apartment buildings – say renters gain access to various amenities that don't come with money-back, opt-out options. "As with other services and facilities that may be provided in a multi-tenant setting (e.g., gym facilities, landscaping, party room), a tenant that chooses to live in the MTE necessarily opts in to the choices made by the MTE owner as to the services and facilities offered, with no expectation of receiving a credit if the service or facility is not used by the tenant," lawyers from Comcast, Charter and Cox said in a meeting last week with staff from the offices off all five FCC Commissioners. FCC Chair Jessica **Rosenworcel** on March 5 proposed a ban on bulk billing in broad terms in an effort to allow renters, for example, to sign up for fixed wireless service from **T-Mobile** or **Verizon** without having to pay for the broadband service provided by the landlord. The cable team stressed two other points. First, "a significant portion of low-income consumers live in MTEs, and BEAD and other government programs are focused on increasing deployment and adoption in these buildings." **Second**, FCC precedent supports cable's position: "The [FCC] last addressed bulk billing in 2010 and found that that the benefits of bulk billing are greater than its harms." The FCC Chairman in **Network Slicing**: The rivalry between cable broadband ISPs and Fixed Wireless Access (FWA) can't be hidden. It's popping in **Super Bowl** ads, before ad watchdogs, and on open calls held by CEOs with Wall Street analysts. Now there's a fourth venue: the FCC's Net Neutrality docket. Sounding a lot like advocates at the George Soros-backed New America organization, cable lawyers are telling the FCC that unnamed FWA companies do not deserve a carve out from Net Neutrality obligations for new specialized services like **network slicing**. "The [FCC] should decline calls to revise those definitions to incorporate overt references to, or special allowances or more flexible regulatory treatment for, particular technologies, such as 'network slicing' employed on 5G wireless networks," cable lawyers for Comcast, Charter and Cox said in a March 20 filing. In case the FCC didn't get the point, the cable side added, "The [FCC] likewise should refrain from issuing any blanket determination that network slicing will be treated as a [non broadband] data service or that network slicing within a [broadband] offering constitutes reasonable network management." T-Mobile, the No. 1 FWA provider with 4.7 million subscribers, said no exemption will drag down investment and innovation. Michael Calabrese, Director, Wireless Future, at New America's Open Technology Institute, says T-Mobile wants to establish "the equivalent of an **HOV lane**" designed to sell priority treatment "to mostly deep-pocketed edge providers."

ACP ETFs?: A left of center organization called Next Century Cities is concerned the wind-down of the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) could have complications for low-income households that lose their \$30 monthly broadband discount. NCC is urging the FCC to intervene and protect existing enrollees from ISP bad actors. The organization wants to see the FCC adopt measures that would "disallow providers from charging early termination fees, equipment returns penalties, or new installation charges" adding that doing so "is critical to making a consumer's switch from one plan or provider to another easier." NCC would also like to see the FCC "require providers to disclose, in plain language, how a consumer's bill will increase" and "require providers to report the number of previous ACP

subscribers that have been migrated to new or existing low cost plans a provider has available, or whether that consumer has not continued service." The point, NCC said, is that the FCC will then be able to determine "which new or existing plans providers are using as equivalent low-cost options for consumers" and "if a provider has a large drop off in subscribership, indicating whether they may be engaging in **digital discrimination** and pricing a significant portion of low-income consumers out of the market."

Quick Takes

All-In Pricing Deadlines: According to the <u>Davis Wright Tremaine</u> law firm, here are the effective dates of the FCC's new All-In Pricing rules for cable and satellite TV providers: "The [FCC] will publish the rules in the Federal Register, and they become effective 30 days thereafter, but MVPDs are required to comply with the rules either by December 19, 2024, or when OMB completes its review, whichever is later. MVPDs with less than \$47 million in annual receipts are required to comply by the later of March 19, 2025, or the completion of OMB review."

Altice USA CFO: For Altice USA, the turnaround will need more time. CFO Marc Sirota said last Friday that he expects the company's first quarter broadband numbers to look the same as the fourth quarter's. "Competition is at an all-time high – overbuilders, fixed wireless. So, even as we look at the fourth quarter and as we turn to 2024, I mean we see these challenges remain in place and so for [the] first quarter, we expect broadband losses to be fairly consistent with what we saw in the fourth quarter," he said at the **New Street Research** conference. In 4Q23, Altice USA lost 27,000 broadband subs.

Fun Fact: Omaha investor Warren Buffett – famous for saying he likes companies with competitive **moats** filled with crocodiles – has seen his stake in Apple grow to a gigantic \$174 billion. 

TECH OF THE TOWN

FCC, FTC COMMISSIONERS ON THE HILL TODAY — Two separate House Energy and Commerce subcommittee hearings will dig into the budgets of the FCC and FTC. Get ready for some partisan fireworks over the agencies' recent moves to crack down on telecom and tech companies — alongside questions of whether they should get the funding they've asked for.

— Where the numbers stand: The hearings today come after the House Appropriations Committee approved a <u>funding bill</u> last month for agencies including the FCC and FTC. The GOP proposal would provide the FCC \$416 million for fiscal year 2025, which would come in \$32 million short of the agency's request. That funding bill includes partisan policy riders, like blocking the FCC from implementing <u>its net neutrality</u> and <u>digital discrimination rules</u>.

The FTC, on the other hand, would get \$388 million under the House bill, which is roughly \$146 million short of its request.

Amendments for the bill funding both agencies <u>were due last night</u>, so a floor vote might be coming up on the horizon.

— What the FCC has to say: Don't expect the hearing with FCC commissioners to be too pleasant. Republican lawmakers and commissioners have protested the agency's "heavy-handed regulations."

"The last time the FCC was before us, we discussed its role in President [Joe] Biden's broadband takeover and its overregulation of the communications industry. Unfortunately, the agency has only continued down this path," subcommittee Chair Bob Latta (R-Ohio) plans to say, per his prepared remarks shared with MT.

GOP Commissioner Brendan Carr plans to oppose his own agency's request for a budget increase of nearly 15 percent for fiscal year 2025, according to his prepared testimony.

"The FCC's budget request and many of its recent actions reflect the Biden administration's misplaced priorities and a massive regulatory overreach," Carr is set to say. The Republican commissioner will also use the recent <u>Supreme Court decision</u> overturning Chevron deference to make his case that the agency "is exceeding its authority in significant ways." As an example, he plans to point to a <u>May proposal from Chair Jessica Rosenworcel</u> to require disclosures on political ads containing AI-generated content.

Fellow GOP Commissioner Nathan Simington, <u>per a copy of his prepared testimony</u>, will echo Carr's concerns.

Democratic commissioners, on the other hand, will defend the agency's budget and its recent moves.

Rosenworcel <u>plans to tout</u> the commission's accomplishments to close the digital divide — including the beleaguered <u>Affordable Connectivity Program</u> — and <u>protect U.S. networks from security threats</u> — via the rip and replace program to remove Chinese-made telecom gear — to justify the agency's \$448 million request.

"This amount will ensure that the commission can meet its statutory mandates and uphold the core values of our laws — consumer protection, universal service, national security, and public safety — all while keeping pace with everchanging and advancing technologies," Rosenworcel intends to say. She also plans to defend the agency's moves to reinstate net neutrality.

Commissioners also plan to once again urge lawmakers to reauthorize the agency's spectrum auction authority. Revenues from that auction could shore up several agency priorities, including reviving the ACP.

Subcommittee ranking member <u>Doris Matsui</u> (D-Calif.) will call on her fellow lawmakers to support Rosenworcel's priorities by securing more funding for the rip-and-replace program and the ACP.

"As a subcommittee, we should be building up the FCC's ability to protect consumers and oversee our networks," Matsui plans to say, per her opening statement shared with MT. "The stakes are simply too high for Congress to undermine the FCC's progress."

— **Meanwhile, next door:** The House Energy and Commerce Innovation, Data and Commerce Subcommittee will hear from all five FTC commissioners.

They last appeared before the panel in April last year. With the agency's two Republicans — Melissa Holyoak and Andrew Ferguson — starting earlier this year, today's hearing will have the commission at full strength.

Expect standard partisan grumbling. Last year, Subcommittee Chair <u>Gus</u>
<u>Bilirakis</u> (R-Fla.) <u>accused FTC Chair Lina Khan</u> of waging a "leftist crusade" on

behalf of the White House. And while <u>Khan is expected</u> to call the proposed cuts to her agency's budgets "devastating," all eyes will be on Holyoak and Ferguson as a potential audition for the head spot in the event of a second Trump Administration.

To that end, both Republicans are expected to focus on the claim that some conservatives are unfairly treated on social media. "I agree with my friend Commissioner Holyoak that the Commission should examine whether social media platforms were knowingly violating their terms of services when they deplatformed customers in 2020," Ferguson wrote in his prepared remarks.

Though neither commissioner name-dropped a company, they appear to have been alluding to platforms that blocked former President Donald Trump and his fellow election deniers following the deadly Jan. 6, 2021, attack on the U.S. Capitol. Meta suspended Trump from Facebook and Instagram; and Amazon banned Parler, the conservative social media company, from its web hosting service.

"Put bluntly, denying access to financial services or deplatforming can reduce these consumers to second-class citizens," Holyoak is expected to say. She will repeat her call from May for the FTC to conduct a study on "the role that platforms play in controlling and denying access to the digital commons."

ON TODAY'S POD

NELSON TALKS AI POLICY — On <u>today's POLITICO Tech Podcast</u>, former White House Office of Science and Technology Policy acting director <u>Alondra Nelson said she's optimistic</u> that even if former President Donald Trump wins back the White House in November, there could be some continuity when it comes to AI policy.

"I think that there's areas for bipartisanship, and I think that there could be continuity of Biden-Harris policy in a new Trump administration," said Nelson, who helped write the Biden administration's <u>Blueprint for an AI Bill of Rights</u> and is now a distinguished senior fellow at the think tank Center for American Progress.

Democrats have emphasized the need to guard against bias in AI systems, while

Republicans have pointed to the need to compete with China. Still, Nelson argues there's actually common ground, "particularly now that AI policy has become just part of public discourse."

She pointed to a <u>GOP-sponsored bill in Oklahoma</u>, which was based on the AI Bill of Rights, as evidence that protecting civil rights may in fact be an area of broad agreement. "No one wants to be subject to biased systems, and no one wants to be discriminated against in a mortgage evaluation, or, being screened for a job by biased AI systems."

GOP CALLS FOR AI EO REPEAL — It's official: President Joe Biden's AI executive order would likely die in a Trump presidency. The Republican National Committee on Monday <u>released its 2024 platform</u> outlining the party's priorities if it wins control of the White House and Congress in the fall. The 16-page document calls for a wholesale repeal of Biden's landmark AI executive order, saying it "hinders AI innovation" and "imposes Radical Leftwing ideas on the development of this technology."

This is the clearest GOP signal on the executive order yet. Republicans in Congress had <u>raised concerns</u> over the order's use of the Defense Production Act to require tech companies to provide information to the government about advanced AI projects. Now, it is clear Republicans want to roll back the whole order, including provisions that call on federal agencies to prevent bias and discrimination in public-facing AI tools.

"In its place, Republicans support AI Development rooted in Free Speech and Human Flourishing," the GOP says in its platform.



— Audacy under the microscope: A big-ticket radio deal that's been spooking Republicans (largely due to the involvement of billionaire and far-right boogeyman George Soros) is now set for a vote at the Federal Communications Commission, after Sen. <u>Ted Cruz</u> (R-Texas) successfully pressured FCC leadership to dig into concerns raised by the restructuring.

FIRST IN MT: MORE SCRUTINY FOR AUDACY RADIO SHAKE-UP

— Republican lawmakers worried about the influence of their least favorite liberal billionaire have successfully pressured the Federal Communications Commission to more carefully review the reorganization of one of the country's biggest radio broadcasters.

Ahead of plans to more widely announce later today, the office of Senate Commerce ranking member Ted Cruz (R-Texas) told John that FCC commissioners will now hold a vote on the rejiggering of radio broadcaster Audacy instead of letting it be considered at the staff level, with Cruz staff citing their own intel from FCC officials.

It's a win for Republicans concerned about the power that Audacy's restructuring would give to left-leaning billionaire George Soros over scores of radio stations — and their millions of listeners — ahead of November's elections. The billionaire has sunk vast amounts of money into liberal and progressive causes, and sits at the center of a dizzying array of conspiracy theories peddled by the far-right (and sometimes, Republican lawmakers).

The expected commission vote appears to be a change of heart for Rosenworcel, who in late April told Congress that "Bureau staff will review the record and decide if the transfer is in the public interest."

"I am very pleased that Chairwoman [Jessica] Rosenworcel has come to her senses and abandoned her plan to have unaccountable bureaucrats rubber-stamp George Soros's takeover of Audacy," Cruz said in a statement shared with John.

A Rosenworcel spokesperson declined to comment on Cruz's characterization, citing longstanding FCC policy around pending

transactions.

— Lots of ears at stake: Audacy owns more than 200 radio stations, making it the second-largest radio broadcaster in the country and giving it significant reach (and, potentially, political sway). But the Philadelphia-based company declared bankruptcy early this year, prompting Soros Fund Management to step in. The deal would save Audacy financially while making the Soros group its largest shareholder.

First, however, the reorg has to receive FCC approval due to its reshuffling of broadcast licenses. And while Audacy already laid out its <u>proposed changes</u> in applications before the commission earlier this year, Republican lawmakers have called for tighter scrutiny.

In April, Rep. Chip Roy (R-Texas) said the plans should be "subject to rigorous FCC oversight to ensure U.S. radio stations are not subject to undue influence" and include "a full review of the foreign ownership interests as required by the law" rather than temporarily putting off such vetting as Audacy requests (the deal, Audacy notes, will put it over the current foreign ownership limits). Rep. Nick Langworthy (R-N.Y.) offered similar concerns, telling the FCC that same month that the sale "is the latest in a series of moves by a partisan, progressive billionaire to consolidate control over the media and flood hundreds of local radio stations with far-left ideology and propaganda."

— **GOP fears the rubber stamp:** Many FCC matters can be handled by bureau staff without coming before the full commission for a vote — though the decision is always at the chair's discretion.

But in this case, Republicans say kicking the Audacy decision to FCC staff would sidestep much-needed scrutiny, especially given some temporary waivers involved over foreign ownership (senior GOP Commissioner Brendan Carr <u>warned in June</u> against any "Soros shortcut" for Audacy).

The FCC has approved similar radio bankruptcy restructuring plans in the past, including staff-level sign-off of plans from iHeart Media

during the Trump years. But these procedural calculations are a sensitive topic for Cruz, who <u>was enraged</u> last year to see Rosenworcel <u>avoid a full commission vote</u> in the FCC's review of the Standard General-Tegna broadcast TV merger. A bureau-level decision ultimately spelled the death of that deal.

— **Cruz takes the dial**: Cruz repeatedly <u>pressed the FCC's</u> two <u>Democratic commissioners</u> as well as <u>both Republicans</u> on Audacy this summer, saying the commissioners needed to cast votes on the restructuring instead of relying on staff review. In his new statement, Cruz credits the two GOP commissioners with helping secure a full vote, which is now apparently pending (details of proposed circulating orders aren't public).

"Considering the significance of the matter at stake — a request for a waiver of statutory foreign ownership limits to transfer Audacy's hundreds of broadcast licenses to new owners in the run-up to the Presidential election — I have repeatedly said that a full Commission vote is both a basic duty of the FCC commissioners and necessary to protect the interests of the American public," the Texas Republican said. Cruz added that he's "grateful to Commissioners Carr and Simington for working with me to bring greater transparency and accountability to the federal bureaucracy."

— Why so worried? Audacy has strenuously denied that it would receive any special treatment as part of the FCC's approval process. The broadcaster defended its plans in a May regulatory filing, criticizing "ill-informed" attacks from the conservative Media Research Center and describing its proposed restructuring as "fully consistent" with FCC precedent.

"Audacy's prompt emergence from bankruptcy, with substantially less debt and improved operational arrangements, is critical to the continued operations of its stations and its ability to remain a competitive radio broadcaster," the company told the FCC at the time.

Audacy spokespeople didn't respond to a request for comment about the FCC review or Cruz's recent characterizations of the transaction. — Clock's ticking: Audacy voiced fresh financial anxiety this week around the delayed approval of its restructuring — a reorganization that is now likely to be even further delayed as the review moves to the commissioners themselves.

And on Wednesday night, Carr signaled he still has reservations about the planned restructuring. He told John he's concerned the parties are seeking a "new and special shortcut" by seeking a temporary and limited waiver of the foreign ownership limits in their plans, rather than going through the commission's process for reviewing these matters.

"My position is pretty simple: I think the Commission should follow the rules and processes that it codified in federal law," Carr said. "Is there something unique about these parties to this transaction that merit unprecedented Commission-level relief?"

Audacy, however, worries that would be too time-consuming. In its plans, Audacy warned the FCC that "deferring the company's emergence from bankruptcy pending a lengthy foreign ownership review would require substantial delay that would imperil Audacy's restructuring and otherwise frustrate the Commission's policy of accommodating the policies of the federal bankruptcy laws."

THE CONTENT WARS

THORN SHEDS LIGHT ON KIDS' CHANGING ONLINE

EXPERIENCE — Roughly 1 in 10 minors say they know peers who have used generative artificial intelligence tools to create nonconsensual intimate images of other minors, per <u>a report released</u> on Wednesday from Thorn, the anti-human trafficking group that advocates for legislation that would boost protections for kids online.

The report — which details findings from a survey of 1,040 minors ages 9-17 that was conducted online from Nov. 3 to Dec. 1, 2023 — also found that the number of kids experiencing harmful interactions online, such as bullying and sexual encounters, continues to increase

from Thorn's previous findings in 2020 and 2022.

The report comes as Capitol Hill struggles to pass laws that would strengthen safety and privacy protections for kids online.

— What Congress has cooking: Lawmakers in Washington are faced with a plethora of kids' online safety bills — most notably the Kids Online Safety and Privacy Act, a mashup of the Kids Online Safety Act and the Children and Teens' Online Privacy Protection Act. KOSPA prohibits companies from targeting minors with ads and limits the amount of data that platforms can collect on users younger than 17. While the Senate passed KOSPA in late July, the measure may struggle to get through the House.

Other kids' online safety bills include the <u>Kids Off Social Media Act</u>, which would prohibit people under age 13 from using social media. There's also a handful focused on broadly combating AI-generated nonconsensual intimate images, such as the <u>TAKE IT DOWN Act</u>, the <u>DEFIANCE Act</u> and the <u>Intimate Privacy Protection Act</u>. The TAKE IT DOWN Act <u>advanced out of the Senate Commerce Committee in July</u>, but the other bills have yet to progress in Congress.

In a Wednesday interview with MT, Emily Slifer, Thorn's director of policy, said that in order to pass laws protecting kids online, lawmakers need to "pick and choose the parts that people can agree on and get smaller pieces of legislation through, as opposed to trying to do these giant holistic bills." She said those key pieces should include duty of care provisions (which requires platforms to take steps to prevent harm) and "safety by design" mandates (requiring platforms to design their products with kids' safety in mind, such as defaulting to maximum privacy settings for underage users).

KOSPA has a duty of care requirement that industry and some civil rights advocacy groups have opposed, given its potential application to content that may not be harmful. Progressive tech groups like Fight for the Future have <u>raised concerns</u> that a future Federal Trade Commission — which would be empowered to determine what content is considered harmful — could use the bill to "pressure platforms into

automated filtering of important but controversial topics like LGBTQ issues and abortion." Those groups have advocated for a duty of care provision that is explicitly "content neutral."

— **States to the rescue?** State legislatures have moved to fill the gap left by Washington on kids' online safety, specifically with <u>measures</u> targeting social media platforms' design and imposing duty of care requirements on companies.

But many of those laws have either been halted by the courts or tangled up in lawsuits brought by the tech industry, which <u>has argued that laws like California's Age-Appropriate Design Code</u> violate the First Amendment.

Slifer told MT that a patchwork of state laws is not the right approach. "It's going to become harder and harder to implement and enforce across the states if there's not an overarching piece of federal regulation," she said.

ON THE HILL

HOUSE E&C DEMS PRAISE FCC'S AI MOVE — House Energy and Commerce ranking member Frank Pallone (D-N.J.) and Democrats on the Communications and Technology Subcommittee sent a letter on Wednesday to Rosenworcel, endorsing the agency's move to open a rulemaking to require the disclosure of AI in campaign ads (despite GOP objections).

"While we understand that it may not be possible to enact these new rules prior to the November election, these rules will only become more important for future elections," the lawmakers wrote. They encouraged Rosenworcel to "complete this rulemaking expeditiously."

— FCC leapfrogs the Hill: Congress had a chance just before the August recess to advance rules regulating the use of AI in political ads, when Sen. Amy Klobuchar (D-Minn.) tried to get her Protect Elections from Deceptive AI Act and AI Transparency in Elections Act through the Senate via unanimous consent (it didn't work). The lack of action

from Congress has led federal agencies (like the FCC) and <u>state</u> <u>legislatures to fill the gap</u>.

— **Eyes on the FEC:** The Federal Election Commission <u>took up a</u> <u>petition</u> from the consumer advocacy group Public Citizen last August, asking it to issue new rules clarifying that <u>existing campaign law</u> on fraudulent misrepresentation applies to AI. A public comment period on the matter closed in October, and the agency hasn't acted on it since.

Axios reported last week that the FEC would not propose new rules on AI before the election. But on Wednesday, Democratic Commissioner Ellen Weintraub posted on X that the petition for rulemaking on AI in campaign ads "will be back on the agenda" at the agency's Aug. 29 meeting.

Traditionally a leading state in delivering broadband to its citizens, Minnesota now finds itself at odds with a broadband definition that the FCC itself recently changed. The federal definition of broadband was recently increased from 25/3 to 100/20, yet the lower speed was the delineation when determining "unserved" for BEAD.

INDIANA PUBLIC RADIO: Monroe County wants to know your internet speed

But the areas that the FCC thinks have access to high-speed internet could still be underserved. John Baeten, Monroe County GIS Coordinator, said the FCC's map is largely inaccurate.

1-Some states had a bit of windfall when the FCC established the Enhanced A-CAM program for small incumbent rural providers. Warner Bros. Mr. Newhouse and Mr. Miron are both executives at Advance, a private, family-held business whose holdings include the Condé Nast glossy magazine empire that publishes titles such as Vogue and The New Yorker.

Salem announced in December that it was selling its Regnery Publishing division to the independent book publisher Skyhorse Publishing. In the annual filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission, Salem says it sold Regnery for \$3 million. And the sale came at a pre-tax loss of \$1 million. The company is still waiting on receiving the last \$500,000 in the deal. It was held in an escrow account for potential expenses, such as unpaid royalties or co-op incurred for books sold prior to the closing date.

As a result, it is spinning off WSPA to bring its Greenville-Spartanburg cluster into compliance. In a market that size, Audacy is allowed to have up to seven full-power stations.

Interestingly, the question of legally mandating retransmission payments from "virtual" MVPDs (i.e., YouTube TV, Hulu Live+, Sling TV), remains outstanding in an unresolved FCC notice of proposed rulemaking first issued in 2014, which the NAB has been pressing the commission to address since late last year. vMVPDs' willingness to pay voluntarily while joining forces with the big four broadcast networks to oppose FCC action serves as another demonstration of market clout wielded by some station groups.

But the current regime has worked in the traditional ecosystem to ensure that every local community is served by a local broadcast station rather than a national alternative. So I think it's premature to say whether Congress should be regulating this space going forward

in a very specific way. But what I can say is that the FCC needs to take a hard look at this; we've asked the FCC to reopen its record in the currently dormant virtual MVPD proceeding that it opened nearly 10 years ago, and to ask these questions and examine the impact that the proliferation of streaming is having on consumers' access to local broadcast. And we're gonna continue to push for that.

Audacy previously operated seven stations in this market, including five FMs, surpassing the legal limit by one under special authority from the FCC. This came after Audacy's acquisition of WSPA in 1999 from Sinclair Broadcast Group as part of Entercom's purchase of 41 stations. As a result of its Chapter 11 bankruptcy and restructuring, Audacy lost its grandfathered status in the market. Norsan purchased the station for \$700,000 from a divestiture trust with Kalil & Co., per documents filed with the FCC, with a 10% deposit managed by Putbrese, Hunsacker & Trent acting as the escrow agent.

The commission voted 3-2 in October on the proposal to reinstate open internet rules adopted in 2015 and re-establish the commission's authority over broadband internet.

Warnings from both the FBI and the Federal Communications Commission have highlighted risks of ByteDance potentially sharing TikTok user data with the Chinese government.

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Social Media Summary

From Apr. 4 to 5, there were around 3,600 social media posts mentioning the FCC. Most content was on Twitter (80%, or around 2,900 posts), followed by Reddit (15%), Forums (3%), Blogs (1%), Comments (0%), and Facebook (0%).

The Twitter account of NewsNation (200k reach, 8 engagements) had the most popular social media post on that topic.

Commissioner Carr tweeted (54k reach, 52 engagements) out his continued opposition to net neutrality, posting a video that compared some of the obscure musings of Jordan Peterson with the rhetoric used by net neutrality advocates.

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CNN: Internet price hikes for low-income Americans could begin in May as federal funds run dry, FCC says

The US government says that next month it can only pay about half of what low-income Americans are eligible for under a popular federal benefits program that is running out of money — a crisis that threatens to plunge millions of households into economic distress within weeks. The announcement by the Federal Communications Commission reflects the first concrete impacts of Congress' failure to extend the Affordable Connectivity Program, a pandemic-era benefit that provides monthly discounts on internet service to more than 23 million US households, including seniors, veterans and schoolchildren.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency likes the idea of reaching more non-English speakers with emergency alerts, but it has come out against a proposal to lean on prescripted alerts to get the job done. FEMA says a proposal by the Federal Communications Commission "may not be an effective approach," saying the use of prepared alerts would not meet the key elements of emergency messaging. FEMA says the use of pre-installed templates in station EAS equipment would mean the alerts shared would lack a description of the threat or event, the location and population at risk, any guidance on what protective action to take, when people should begin taking the protective action, as well as the time those steps should be completed.

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INSIDE RADIO: Pirate FMs Lead FCC To Send Warnings To Property Owners In San Francisco And New York.

Two spots where pirate radio has long been a problem – San Francisco and the New York metro – are once again the targets of Enforcement Bureau action. The Federal Communications Commission has sent warning letters to property owners in both, alerting them that they could face fines of nearly \$2.4 million for hosting an unlicensed radio station. On the West Coast, the FCC says field agents last month were investigating a complaint about a pirate station operating on 89.7 FM in the Bay Area. That led them to a

Miguel Street property in San Francisco. Who was operating the station is not yet clear, but the property's owner, a trust run by Cesar Ascarrunz, was sent a warning that it could be on the hook for allowing the unlicensed FM to continue operating.

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INSIDE RADIO: Audacy Asks Bankruptcy Court To Extend 'Removal Deadline' For Pending Civil Actions.

As it waits for the Federal Communications Commission to sign off on its Chapter 11 financial reorganization, Audacy has asked the U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Houston to extend the deadline by which it can transfer civil actions filed against the broadcaster back to the district courts where they are pending. Audacy, in what's considered a routine legal maneuver, last week filed a motion to extend what's known as the removal deadline for such cases by 134 days, from the current deadline of April 6 to Aug. 18.

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INSIDE RADIO: NAB Says FCC 'Lost At Sea' And Faster Application Processing Isn't What Stations Need Most.

Quicker application processing is what the Federal Communications Commission is offering radio and television broadcasters as an incentive to do more local programming, but the National Association of Broadcasters says that is not what stations need most. The NAB says that while it "appreciates" the idea of what the FCC is trying to do, it would "do nothing" to incentivize broadcasters to provide more local journalism or generate other locally originated programming. That's because the NAB says the proposal "fails to grasp" the fundamental economic and competitive realities underpinning broadcasters' programming decisions.

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BROADBAND BREAKFAST: FCC Chair Pitches Public Safety Benefits of Net Neutrality Rules Ahead of Vote

The Federal Communications Commission chairwoman reiterated arguments for net neutrality as a public safety and national security measure on Monday during a round table at the Santa Clara County Fire Department. Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel spoke at the San Francisco bay area fire department to highlight one of the more high-profile instances of a broadband provider throttling data — one of the abuses net neutrality rules are designed to prevent — when Verizon throttled the fire department's internet during a major wildfire in 2018.

The FCC is proposing to open a specific segment of the 5 GHz spectrum to unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) or drones, aiming to enhance their usability in critical applications like emergency response and commercial services. This regulatory initiative seeks to designate the 5030-5091 MHz band exclusively for drones, improving communications during wildfires, disaster recovery, and for first responders. Traditionally, most drones operate under general unlicensed and low-power wireless communications rules, predominantly in the 2.4GHz and 5GHz bands, which are also heavily utilized for consumer and professional Wi-Fi networks. This shared use can often lead to interference, particularly in densely populated areas, affecting operational reliability.

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RADIO ONLINE: NAB & NPR Oppose FCC Proposed Localism Efforts

The FCC is proposing changes aimed at encouraging radio outlets to focus more on local programming by altering licensing and application processes in favor of stations that offer a Commission-approved quota of local content. This move has sparked controversy and attracted criticism, particularly from the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) and National Public Radio (NPR), both of which have advised against proceeding with the plan.

The co-author of AB 2239 said it would make California the first state in the nation to codify the Federal Communication Commission's newly adopted definition of digital discrimination into state law.

The MPA's latest push for a site-blocking law comes about two weeks before a Federal Communications Commission vote to restore net neutrality rules that prohibit ISPs from blocking and throttling websites. The proposed net neutrality rules apply only to lawful content, but opponents of site-blocking legislation fear a blocking law would undermine the goals of net neutrality by compelling ISPs to block both lawful and unlawful content.

Narrowly scoped prosecutions of election lies are one piece of a much larger puzzle when it comes to election integrity—much like the Federal Communication Commission's (FCC's) ban on robocalls generated by artificial intelligence, which followed an incident in which New Hampshire voters received messages in Joe Biden's voice telling them not to vote in the 2024 Democratic primary. That FCC effort didn't solve everything, either, but it adds just a bit more of a deterrent for anyone considering that kind of dirty trick.

The US Supreme Court is considering whether to overrule or severely cut back on what is known as Chevron deference. It would be a mistake for the court to do that. Federal agencies such as the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, Federal Communications Commission, and many others must apply the laws passed by Congress when carrying them out. It's impossible for laws to be crystal-clear on every issue that arises over decades of implementing them, so agencies must interpret those laws.

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Social Media Summary

From Apr. 10 to 11, there were around 2,700 social media posts mentioning the FCC. Most content was on Twitter (84%, or around 2,300 posts), followed by Reddit (11%), Forums (3%), Blogs (1%), Comments (1%), and Facebook (0%).

The three social media posts with the greatest reach came from the Twitter accounts of The Washington Post (20m reach), ABC News (17.8m reach), and The Associated Press (16m reach), which publicized their articles on the FCC requiring broadband nutrition labels. The social media post with the next greatest reach came from the Twitter account of Yahoo Finance (1.8m reach), which publicized a CNN article on the Affordable Connectivity Program.

One trending topic on social media was the FCC requiring broadband nutrition labels. The Twitter account of The Washington Post (20m reach, 53 engagements) had the most popular social media post on that topic. Another trending topic on social media was a GOP representative pressing George Soros over his takeover of an American radio company. The Twitter account of the Daily Caller (1.1m reach, 53 engagements) had the most popular social media post on that topic.

Commissioner Carr tweeted (54k reach, 604 engagements) out a screenshot of reporting that claimed Meta blocked all posts from The Kansas Reflector after the outlet was critical of the company.

Right now, when drones want to use certain radio frequencies for controlling their flight (like the C-Band), they usually need special permission from both the FAA and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). Because it's so tough to get this permission, many drone flights just use radio frequencies that don't need permission (called unlicensed spectrum), especially those in the Industrial, Scientific, and Medical (ISM) band. But this can cause problems because there are often a lot of other signals in those bands that can mess up the drone's signals, making it harder to control and less reliable.

Because Sony is foreign-owned, it's purchase of Paramount's CBS TV stations would trigger review by the Federal Communications Commission, as well as agencies that check telecom transactions for national-security implications. The deliberations can take six months or more.

Four years ago, Claudia Aleman and her family had only one way to get online — through their cellphones. Without internet service on a computer, her youngest daughter couldn't get homework assignments in on time, her parents couldn't keep up with online doctor visits, and the English classes she wanted to sign up for were out of reach. Then came a game-changer: The federal government started offering a subsidy that covered \$30 of the family's \$80 monthly internet bill. But while opening mail at her home in South Gate two months ago, Aleman came across a letter from the Federal Communications Commission announcing that the Affordable Connectivity Program they had come to rely on would end in May unless Congress approved more funding.

Kramer said he was cooperating with the New Hampshire Department of Justice, the New Hampshire Attorney General's office and the Federal Communications Commission "to not only satisfy a subpoena but in the future help them to prevent the kind of artificial intelligence that I've tried to prevent." He also defended his actions, arguing that the creation of the robocall led to substantial national exposure about the dangers of Algenerated deepfakes, spurred regulatory reforms by the FCC and state governments and pushed lawmakers to take the threat of election-related deepfakes more seriously. He reiterated claims made in previous interviews that the robocall cost \$500 to produce and generated "\$5 million of media exposure."

A closely-related area is connectivity: at last year's ITS America Conference & Expo in Grapevine, TX, the Federal Communications Commission announced its decision to grant a joint waver request to deploy cellular Vehicle to Everything technology in the upper 20 MHz part of the 5.9 GHz band. Drake is optimistic about progress, with USDoT mulling over deployment and FCC ironing out final regulatory steps. "It's a little bit of waiting," he says. "There's some pent-up demand because of the uncertainty that we've faced over the last few years. It's important that we don't lose momentum. There is excitement to deploy."

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THE CONVERSATION: For millions of Americans, high-speed internet is unavailable or unaffordable – a telecommunications expert explains how to bring broadband to the places that need it the most

The Federal Communications Commission, which is in charge of setting an official definition for broadband in the country, defines broadband as an always-on internet connection of 100 megabits-per-second download and 20 megabits-per-second upload. But what high-speed internet fundamentally means to Americans is do we have the connectivity necessary to go about our digital lives. Can we stream Netflix? Can we go on Zoom? Can we file our taxes? Can we do our homework? Can we do our jobs? Can we game?

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THE HILL: What happens next to TikTok

A construction permit application for a new LPFM station on 90.7 FM in Baton Rouge, La., was dismissed for failing to meet the FCC's localism requirement based on its listed headquarters address.Breakthrough Community Services applied for the station during the 2023 LPFM window. It sought to transmit from a location just south of the state's capital city. The nonprofit, established in 1999, listed a Hattiesburg, Miss., location as its local address. It is affiliated with Mt. Olive Baptist Church there.

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GOVERNMENT TECHNOLOGY: Experts Analyze Court Ruling Against E-Rate Funding Source

A recent federal court ruling is unlikely to mean the permanent end of the E-rate program that funds school telecommunication services, but the program's future is still uncertain, according to legal experts in a webinar this week. 



As of January 1st, over 23 million households were enrolled in the program. Funding is expected to run out in April, months before the original projected end date. In January, the Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act was introduced by a bipartisan and bicameral group of members of Congress. The bill would infuse the program with \$7 billion, a billion more than the Biden administration requested in 2023, and keep the ACP afloat until the end of 2024.

He voluntarily surrendered the licenses in May 2023, and the FCC formally wiped their licenses a month later.

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LIGHT READING: The FWA wait for 6GHz may soon be over

The 6GHz band may soon be opened for unlicensed fixed wireless access (FWA) services, according to those in the industry. The move could add a significant amount of fresh spectrum to a market that has been growing by leaps and bounds. The action would also bring to an end years of waiting. Many in the industry expected the FCC to release the band for FWA operations last year. That didn't happen. Moreover, the issue could have a significant impact on the broader market for telecom services in the US. That's because the 6GHz band might also be used to create backhaul links for fiber networks in rural areas, including those funded by the US government's \$42 billion Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) program.

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THE HEARING REVIEW: Making All Phones Hearing Aid Compatible

Technology to improve the hearing experience of people with hearing loss is continually evolving. But it often takes the government a while to catch up with related laws, rules, and regulations. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has worked with a group devoted to making more mobile phones hearing aid compatible for many years, with the goal of ensuring those with hearing loss have equal access to communications services as required by section 710 of the Communications Act.

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BROADBAND BREAKFAST: Cable Trade Groups Take FCC To Court Over Digital Discrimination Rules

Cable-affiliated Internet Service Providers are challenging new federal digital discrimination rules in federal court in Washington, D.C, the second major legal case to target the rules. The suit was filed Friday in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit by NCTA - The Internet & Television Association and ACA Connects, which combined represent hundreds of broadband ISPs, the vast majority of them small. Last November, the Federal Communications Commission adopted digital discrimination rules in implementing Section 60506 of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021, a law that also includes \$42.45 billion in broadband deployment grants.

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BROADBAND BREAKFAST: LTD Broadband Challenges FCC Denial of RDOF Funds in Court

LTD Broadband has filed a petition for review of the Federal Communications Commission's decision to deny it funding as part of the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund. The company, which largely offers fixed wireless broadband, filed a request for judicial review with the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals on February 2, contesting the agency decision on December 4.

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DAILY RECORD: Ellensburg Community Radio to construct station, broadcast on FM

Ellensburg Community Radio received approval from the Federal Communications Commission on Wednesday to construct a low-power FM broadcast station to serve Ellensburg, station staff said. The permit allows ECR three years to construct the station. Although there is no set timeline, ECR will move forward on this project as expediently as possible. The station will broadcast at 98.3 on the FM dial. According to its guidelines, a low-power FM station can only be operated by a nonprofit organization or governmental or tribal agency and is intended for noncommercial broadcasting. The station is licensed to

operate at 100 watts, which reaches an area with a radius of approximately 3.5 miles.

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RADIO & TELEVISION BUSINESS REPORT: NAB Lobbies Gómez Staffers On Key Radio Industry Issues

The SVP/Deputy General Counsel of the National Association of Broadcasters and the NAB's Associate General Counsel spent last Tuesday chatting with two staff members in the office of the FCC's newest Commissioner about "various issues" tied to four rulemaking proceedings. This saw Erin Dozier and Larry Walke state their case on behalf of broadcasters on such topics as localism, GeoBroadcast Solutions' ZoneCasting technology, and the Main Studio Rule.

With the debate around EAS distribution a core tenet of the fight to keep AM radio in automobiles, the Federal Communications Commission seeks to enhance the inclusivity of emergency alerts for non-English speaking residents to thirteen additional languages.

Apart from this, the site also mentions the device's support for both 5Ghz and 2.4Ghz Wi-Fi. There is also mention of Bluetooth, which is not a surprise.

Mitigating practices that could speed the country toward phone number exhaustion is a priority item for state officials ahead of NARUC's Feb. 25-28 meeting in Washington, commission officials told us. The state utility regulator association is planning a vote during the meeting on a proposed resolution from Telecom Committee Chair Tim Schram. It urges the FCC "to provide updated guidance on how states should bring forward cases of telephone number resource mismanagement or suspected robocalling using rented telephone numbers to the Commission using the audit process" from Section 52.15(k) of the Telecom Act.

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INSIDE TOWERS: CCA Echoes Lawmakers' Calls to Fully Fund 'Rip & Replace'

Members of the House Energy and Commerce Communications and Technology

Subcommittee urged Congress last Thursday to appropriate \$3.08 billion needed to fully fund the FCC's Rip & Replace program. Regarding communications infrastructure, the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) developed unsecure telecommunications equipment and exported it around the world in order to assist in its espionage activities, committee leaders said. The Biden administration plans to invest billions in the domestic manufacturing of cargo cranes, seeking to counter fears that the use of China-built cranes with advanced software at many U.S. ports poses a potential national security risk. The move is part of a set of actions being taken by the administration on Wednesday that is intended to improve maritime cybersecurity. They include a U.S. Coast Guard security directive to mandate certain digital security requirements for currently deployed foreign-built cranes at strategic seaports, as well as an executive order by President Biden setting baseline cybersecurity standards for computer networks that operate U.S. ports.

The pace and sophistication of cyberattacks against industrial companies are escalating

rapidly, as administration officials warn that nation-states are heavily targeting U.S. critical infrastructure sectors. The U.S. government had taken a similar stance several months earlier, with a senior member of the Federal Communications Commission calling TikTok "a sophisticated surveillance tool that harvests extensive amounts of personal and sensitive data." TikTok and its China-based parent company ByteDance are no strangers to controversy over the potential dangers of the platform, which remains enormously popular even though it's been deemed a threat to national security by Brendan Carr, a commissioner on the US Federal Communications Commission (FCC). In June 2022 he wrote to Apple and Google to request that both companies remove the app from their stores over its collection of sensitive data from people in the United States. However, it remains available on both stores.

U.S. regulators will vote March 14 on a regulatory framework for allowing satellites to use radio waves from terrestrial mobile operators to keep their smartphone users connected beyond the reach of cell towers. Jessica Rosenworcel, chair of the Federal Communications Commission, said Feb. 21 she had shared a final draft of rules with the regulator's other four Commissioners that would pave the way for direct-to-smartphone services in the United States.

If the states' laws really did mandate carriage of important speech while permitting removal of bad speech, I think they would be unconstitutional. But rational minds can differ. THE SAN FERNANDO VALLEY SUN: Assemblymember Mia Bonta Introduces Landmark 'Digital Discrimination' Legislation in California

Assemblymember Mia Bonta (D-Oakland) has introduced AB 2239, groundbreaking legislation that will make California the first state in the nation to codify the Federal Communication Commission's newly adopted definition of digital discrimination as California law. Last November, the FCC defined "digital discrimination of access" as, "policies or practices, not justified by genuine issues of technical or economic feasibility, that (1) differentially impact consumers; access to broadband internet access service based on their income level, race, ethnicity, color, religion, or national origin or (2) are intended to have such differential impact." These federal rules were adopted following a multi-year rulemaking process during which the FCC received and engaged extensive formal input from digital equity advocates, industry stakeholders, and others.

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COMMUNICATIONS DAILY: Fla. Senate Supports Taking Wireless Lifeline Authority From FCC

Florida senators unanimously supported joining other states that designate mobile phone providers as eligible telecom carriers (ETCs) for the federal Lifeline program. On the floor Wednesday, senators voted 37-0 to pass a bill (SB-478) that would transfer wireless ETC designation powers from the FCC to the Florida Public Service Commission. Later, senators debated a bill (HB-1) that would override parents and ban all kids younger than 16 from getting social media accounts.

The California Public Utilities Commission is considering an application by AT&T to waive its responsibilities to be what's called "Carrier of Last Resort," meaning the utility has to offer the copper-wire landline service. The utility said in filings with the commission that the technology for the traditional landlines is old and demand is low. The utility and many of its peers have been petitioning state utility commissions and state legislators, asking to be relieved of the task of maintaining and offering the traditional landline service.

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MARKETPLACE: When cellphones fail, landlines are still a lifeline

It fits into a trend because AT&T, in particular, wants to get out of the landline telephone business. And so it is going to different states, and particularly state legislatures, to try to convince them to allow them to get rid of this service. They've also gone to the FCC [Federal Communications Commission] in 13 states. The filing says the sale already took place on Dec. 27, 2022, but it was never filed with the FCC because the owners didn't realize it was required for a stock sale. Ricardo Angulo was a retiree who lived in South Florida, and had acquired WEGA after his son, who operated the station, died in an auto accident in 2015. He inked the LMA five months after his son's death. Ricardo Angulo then died in August 2023.

In this document, the Federal Communications Commission (Commission or FCC) discusses the adoption of an Order on Reconsideration (Orbital Debris Reconsideration Order), which addressed three petitions for reconsideration challenging the orbital debris mitigation rules adopted by the Commission in 2020. In the Orbital Debris Reconsideration Order, the Commission declined to modify, withdraw, or otherwise change the orbital debris mitigation rules adopted in 2020 Orbital Debris Order, published August 25, 2020, but also provided some clarification and guidance as relevant for some of the issues raised in the petitions for reconsideration.

Eureka College is getting a radio station. The Federal Communications Commission has approved a construction permit for the station that will broadcast at 103.1 FM. Eureka absorbed Lincoln College's radio and television program when Lincoln College closed. But

federal regulations prevented moving Lincoln College's radio station. Eureka had to apply for a new broadcast license.

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THE TIMES OF INDIA: US FCC chief: India's Tiktok ban has set gold standard for the world on how to deal with Chinese threats

FCC commissioner Brendan Carr's visit to India acknowledges India's actions against cybersecurity threats from Chinese companies. He praises India's approach to dealing with threats posed by the CCP on platforms like TikTok and suppliers like Huawei and ZTE.

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GADGETS 360: OnePlus' claim to offer "market-beating" battery life sure has something to do with this large battery

First reported by 9to5Google, an FCC listing could reveal how OnePlus claims to deliver market-beating battery life with its latest smartwatch. The FCC listing suggests that the OnePlus Watch 2 will have a rather large battery with a capacity of 500mAh, which the report claimed is about 64 percent larger than the one in the latest Pixel Watch 2 and about 20 percent larger than the Galaxy Watch 6's (44mm) battery.

The only condition that the FCC put on Cumulus is that it will need to obtain specific approval for any foreign individual, entity, or group that seeks to hold more than five percent of the equity and/or voting interests in the company. In some cases, however, that limit will be raised to 10%. Cumulus will also need to alert the FCC if it becomes aware that it has fallen out of compliance with that requirement.

At first glance, the images amaze and confound: A woman strides along a city street alive with pedestrians and neon lights. A car kicks up a cloud of dust on a mountain road. But upon closer inspection, anomalies appear: The dust plumes don't always quite line up with the car's rear wheels. And those pedestrians are stalking that woman like some eerie zombie horde. This is Sora, a new tool from OpenAI that can create lifelike, minute-long videos from simple text prompts. When the company unveiled it on Feb. 15, experts hailed it as a major moment in the development of artificial intelligence. Google and Meta also have unveiled new AI video research in recent months. The race is on toward an era when anyone can almost instantly create realistic-looking videos without sophisticated CGI tools or expertise.

Critics have claimed it has a left-wing bias or a false understanding of certain topics. Through the restructuring, Audacy expects to eliminate about \$1.6 billion of funded debt — a 80% reduction from approximately \$1.9 billion — to \$350 million. The Philadelphia-based company said it filed prepackaged Chapter 11 proceedings in the U.S. Bankruptcy Court for the Southern District of Texas on Jan. 7 after reaching an agreement with a supermajority of its debtholders. The Federal Communications Commission announced the conclusion of the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund long-form application review last month, which means that no more money will be awarded through Phase I of the program, and no additional defaults or forfeitures will be announced. The announcement coincided with news of another service

provider failing to fulfill their initial bid within the program. Wavelength, a service provider from Arizona, defaulted on its commitment to deploy services to 12,418 locations, after failing to demonstrate its financial qualifications to receive RDOF support adequately.

Cohda Wireless's MK6 connected vehicle technology solution has been certified by the US Federal Communications Commission (FCC) for cellular Vehicle to Everything (C-V2X). The Federal Communications Commission may have found a faster way to resolve telephone pole disputes. At its December meeting, the agency set up a Rapid Broadband Assessment Team, or RBAT, which is comprised of staff from the FCC's Enforcement Bureau and Wireline Competition Bureau. RBAT would be on call to resolve disagreements between utility and telecom companies that could result in delayed broadband deployment.

To make it more affordable for low-income Americans, the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is a Federal Communications Commission (FCC) benefit program that helps ensure that households can afford the broadband they need for work, school, health care, and more. The program provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet-service-eligible households. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers if they contribute more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase price. As of September 2022, over 14 million households had enrolled, which is about a third of the estimated eligible households. The FCC reimburses participating internet service providers for providing discounts that allow people to pay \$30 per month.

Back in October, in an unprecedented move, the US Federal Communications Commission (FCC) announced that it would be issuing its first ever space debris fine, a penalty of \$150,000 to Dish Network, for failing to comply with deorbiting regulations required by US law. "This is a breakthrough settlement," said FCC enforcement bureau chief Loyaan Egal. "It makes it very clear that the FCC has strong enforcement authority and capability to enforce its vitally important space debris rules."

SpaceX is planning for 42,000 satellites to be deployed over time. SpaceX says that it will launch an additional 834 Direct-To-Cell satellites by mid-year 2024. CNN: FCC chairwoman 'urgently' calls on Congress to fund lapsing internet subsidies for millions

Millions of Americans risk losing internet access or may face higher internet prices by as early as April if Congress does not quickly approve more funding for a popular federal aid program, the Federal Communications Commission warned on Monday. In a letter to US lawmakers obtained by CNN, FCC Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel wrote that more than 1,700 participating internet providers "may cut off service to households" when existing funding runs out for the Affordable Connectivity Program, an outgrowth of the 2021 bipartisan infrastructure law that gives qualifying low-income households a monthly discount on internet plans.

REUTERS: Radio broadcaster Audacy seeks fast-track bankruptcy turnaround

Audacy's attorney, Caroline Reckler, told U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Christopher Lopez that she expects "a smooth, prepackaged case," with final court approval of the restructuring by February 21. If the deal is approved, Audacy would emerge from bankruptcy once it receives U.S. Federal Communications Commission approval for its change in ownership, a process that may take "a few months," Reckler said.

Network providers face challenges from weather to supply chain delays as they replace unsecured equipment, but one of the biggest problems remains a shortage of funding for the program, the Federal Communications Commission has told Congress.

Operating a pirate station is about to get even riskier as the Federal Communications Commission implements its annual inflation adjustment to its list of potential fines. It means that anyone who is found to be operating an unlicensed station could now be fined as much as \$119,555 for each day during which such offense occurs up to a maximum of \$2,391,097 beginning this month. That is an increase from 2023's inflation-adjusted amounts of \$115,802 per day with a maximum of \$2,316,034.

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RADIO WORLD: FCC Draft Would Bring a Disaster Reporting Mandate Closer

The FCC is considering imposing new reporting mandates on broadcasters so it can better determine the condition of communication systems following natural disasters. It has been talking about the idea of such a requirement for awhile and appears to be getting serious about it. But it is asking for more information before doing so. If eventually adopted, new rules would require radio and TV broadcasters to file operational status updates with the FCC following disasters like hurricanes and wildfires.

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RADIO WORLD: FCC Seeks to Enhance DIRS Reporting

The FCC has announced a tentative agenda for its January meeting. It includes an item to enhance use of the Disaster Information Reporting System. The commission said it will consider a mandate that would transition the current, voluntary DIRS outage reporting structure to a mandatory structure for certain communications providers.

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BROADBAND BREAKFAST: Alabama, Florida Propose Making RDOF Locations BEAD-Eligible

The letter further cites concerns with difficulty in identifying and confirming locations tied to RDOF commitments, and the aforementioned potential fluctuations in the number of covered locations, which will not be completely finalized until the FCC's final authorization process at RDOF's six-year mark.

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GIZCHINA: OnePlus 12R Spotted at the FCC Ahead of January 23 Launch

OnePlus recently introduced the OnePlus Ace 3 in China and will release its global variant soon under the OnePlus 12R moniker. The OnePlus 12R will launch alongside the global OnePlus 12 on January 23. Ahead of the announcement, the OnePlus 12R passed the FCC certification which hints at its imminent launch.

Chattanooga's biggest locally owned radio station operator is selling two more of its stations to a Lakeland, Florida-based nonprofit that plans to bring more contemporary Christian music to Chattanooga's airwaves to replace ESPN and Big Hits radio. Brewer Media, which in April 2021 sold another pair of its local radio stations to American Family Association for \$610,000, filed papers with the Federal Communications Commission last week to sell "ESPN Chattanooga" 95.3 WALV-FM and Classic Hits "Big 106.9" to the Radio Training Network for \$900,000. Once approved by regulators, the buyers plan to bring their JoyFM Christian music format to Chattanooga as the nonprofit expands into Tennessee for the first time.

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NEXT TV: TCL To Introduce Smart TVs with ATSC 3.0 Tuners (CES 2024)

In late September, what appeared to be bleak news for the moribund ATSC 3.0 broadcast standard broke when Korean CE giant LG said it would stop making smart TVs with ATSC 3.0 tuners because of what it described as patent issues. With LG complaining to the FCC about how the ATSC 3.0 patent pool was aligned and participated with, our sibling publication, TechRadar, wondered at the time if the small group of other smart TV makers that are including ATSC 3.0 tuners in their sets — Samsung, Sony and Hisense — might also give up.

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INSIDE RADIO: NPR's News Podcasts Significantly Safer Than News Podcasts Overall, Analysis Shows.

The review shows 81% of NPR's news content was classified as unrelated or low-risk for sensitive topics based on the Global Alliance for Responsible Media's brand safety standards. That compares to a 54% average for news podcasts overall. The Sounder analysis also finds that NPR has 13% fewer discussions of medium-risk sensitive topics than

news podcasts overall, and that just 2.3% of NPR content is categorized as graphic discussions of high-risk sensitive issues. Thanks to the need to comply with Federal Communications Commission standards, NPR doesn't feature any content categorized as "floor," which is deemed unsuitable for advertising.

Indeed, their bill wouldn't nibble. It would create a new federal commission to regulate online platforms. As Musk smashed buttons on his keyboard, he responded to viewer (and his friend's) questions about Starlink. "You actually take the any of the Starlink terminals around and

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Social Media Summary

From Jan. 8 to 9, there were around 1,800 social media posts mentioning the FCC. Most content was on Twitter (68%, or around 1,200 posts), followed by Reddit (17%), Blogs (9%), Forums (5%), Comments (1%), and Facebook (0%).

The social media post with the greatest reach came from the Twitter account of CBS News (9m reach), which publicized its article on Chairwoman Rosenworcel calling on Congress to provide funding for the Affordable Connectivity Program. The social media post with the second greatest reach came from the Twitter account of Android Headlines (470k reach), which publicized its article on the OnePlus12R being spotted on the FCC website.

One trending topic on social media was the FCC getting input from nearly 200 companies and groups on a range of topics. The Twitter account of Law360 (50k reach, 1 engagement) had the most popular social media post on that topic. Another trending topic on social media was the FCC increasing the scope of rules for data breach notification. The Twitter account of Daily Law News (30k reach, 2 engagements) had the most popular social media post on that topic.

There were no new tweets from Chairwoman Rosenworcel or any of the Commissioners.

2023 was on track to be a record-breaking year for ransomware attacks against education institutions. During the first half of 2023, Comparitech recorded 85 ransomware attacks on schools and colleges and universities across the globe. In the same period of 2022, the research technology site noted just 45. Indeed, school districts from Prince George's County, Maryland, to Minneapolis to Chula Vista, California, fell victim to cyberattacks in 2023. It is a trend that the Federal Communications Commission is hoping to flip with a pilot program it announced in November to provide schools and libraries with better cybersecurity protections.

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INSIDE RADIO: Total Number Of Stations Grew In Past Year, But AM Numbers Continue To Slide.

In a positive sign about the overall health of the radio industry, there were more stations licensed at the start of 2024 than there were a year ago. The gains, however, were made by one segment – noncommercial FMs – as the Federal Communications Commission says

the total number of AM stations dropped another one percent while commercial FM numbers also reversed. The FCC says as of Dec. 31 there were 4,444 licensed AMs. That is a decline of 40 stations from a year earlier, including the loss of eight AMs during the fourth quarter. That means there are fewer AMs now licensed than at any time since the 1970s before the talk radio boom of the 1980s breathed new life into the band.

That's the biggest takeaway from the FCC's latest broadcast station total list, for the three-month period ending December 31, 2023.

Some major U.S. cities are targeting a federal rule that likely stands between them and a gusher of broadband gold. Cable's pay-TV revenue, however, has traditionally been subject to a 5% fee on gross revenue, helping to support municipal balance sheets all over the country. The mixed-use rule, reaffirmed by the FCC in 2019, prevents cities from adding telecommunications or information service fees on cable operators.

Numerous satellite operators welcomed the idea of expanding the range of minor satellite and earth station modifications that can be done without having to first notify the FCC. But support was far more mixed in docket 22-411 filings posted Tuesday when it came to use of deadlines on FCC decisions regarding applications. Commissioners in September by a 4-0 vote adopted a Further NPRM regarding streamlining of satellite and earth station applications (see 2309210055). Reply comments in the docket are due Feb. 6.

K-12 DIVE: 8 K-12 trends to watch in 2024

The severity of the issue is grabbing federal leaders' attention, as the White House and the U.S. Education Department announced efforts in August to bolster K-12 cybersecurity supports. Meanwhile, the Federal Communications Commission in November proposed a 3-year pilot program using \$200 million in agency funds to help schools and libraries fight cybersecurity threats.

In this document, the Federal Communications Commission (Commission) adopts rules to implement the Low Power Protection Act (LPPA or Act), which was enacted on January 5, 2023. The LPPA provides certain low power television (LPTV) stations with a limited window of opportunity to apply for primary spectrum use status as Class A television stations. With limited exceptions, the rules adopted herein are consistent with the Commission's proposals in the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) in this proceeding. In this Order, we further the implementation of the LPPA by establishing the period during which eligible stations may file applications for Class A status, eligibility and interference requirements, and the process for submitting applications.

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FEDERAL REGISTER: Improving Outage Reporting for Submarine Cables and Enhanced Submarine Cable Outage Data

In this document, the Commission announces that the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) approved the information collection associated with the Commission's Report and Order and subsequent Order on Reconsideration. This document, consistent with those documents, fulfills the Commission's commitment that it would publish a document in the Federal Register announcing the effective date of those rules.

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Social Media Summary

Regulators differ on the topic of whether phones need to be in airplane mode or not. For its part, the FAA in the US disallows the use of cellular devices if they do not have their carrier-provided cellular transmitting function turned off (otherwise known as airplane mode). The FAA outlines this policy in Advisory Circular 91.21-1D, where it's made clear in

section 9.2 that using a personal electronic device's cellular transmitting functions in the air is a Federal Communications Commission (FCC) rule which the FAA enforces. Passengers are allowed to use cell phones to make calls on the ground according to the Advisory Circular, but airlines must ensure passengers turn this function off in the air.

Starlink's new mini dish is set to hit the market by the end of this year. "We'll be introducing the Starlink Mini later this year, which can fit in a backpack," SpaceX CEO Elon Musk said in a speech to employees on Friday. A principal NPR and PBS Member serving the Commonwealth of Virginia has petitioned the FCC to add a channel to its Table of Allotments for a city between the college town of Charlottesville and Staunton, along the busy I-81 corridor to the south of the home of James Madison University.

RADIO & TELEVISION BUSINESS REPORT: 'Good Faith' Retrans Fail Yields Huge Proposed WPIX Fine (SUBSCRIPTION REQUIRED)

When it comes to retransmission consent disputes, a broadcast TV station ownership group founded 28 years ago by Chairwoman Nancie Smith and her late husband, David Smith, and led by President Dennis Thatcher has in recent years seen some of the thorniest of negotiations. This led Mission Broadcasting to engage in bitter fights over carriage fee agreements with direct broadcast satellite service provider DirecTV, and the parent of the Xfinity broadband and cable TV services arm of NBCUniversal parent Comcast Corp. Both DirecTV and Comcast went to the FCC to independently address their view that Mission's retransmission consent discussions were unfairly being led by a company it enjoys a shared services agreement with — the nation's No. 1 owner of broadcast television stations. [SUBSCRIPTION REQUIRED]

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RADIO & TELEVISION BUSINESS REPORT: A Fine Day For A CBS-Owned Property In San Francisco

It airs on Channel 44 for those with over-the-air digital antennas and enjoys Cable Channel 12 across many MVPDs serving the San Francisco Bay Area. It is a property formerly known as KBCW, with a call letter change coming in September 2023 to better align itself with its CBS-owned sibling. Now, CBS News & Stations faces a small financial penalty for failing to adhere to a FCC rule.

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RADIO & TELEVISION BUSINESS REPORT: Next Nicked With Fine For Station's Tardy Issues/Programs Filing (SUBSCRIPTION REQUIRED)

A broadcast television station owned by the company that owns the most over-the-air facilities in the U.S. has been handed a proposed fine for its failure to timely file its quarterly issues/programs lists with the FCC.

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YOUGOV: How Americans feel about Trump's proposed policies and the Republican primary candidates

Among Trump's proposals included in the poll, Americans are most likely to strongly or somewhat oppose cutting taxes on corporations (61%), giving the president control over regulatory agencies such as the Federal Communications Commission and the Federal

Trade Commission (59%), and abolishing the U.S. Department of Education (57%). A majority also oppose changing the law to allow presidents to fire civil service workers for any reason (56%).

As of funding year 2017, the Rural Health Care Program grant total is capped at \$571 million annually, adjusted for inflation.

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RADIO INSIGHT: FCC Report 1/14: AM & LPFM Station Counts Drop

The FCC has issued its quarterly station count list showing continued drops in the number of AM, commercial FM, and LPFM totals, while total radio licenses is up due to the growth of non-commercial FMs. 40 AM licenses were turned in over the course of 2023 with 175 lost in the last five years. Ahead of the recent filing window, the number of LPFMs dropped by 48 last year down to 1967 current licenses down from its peak of 2172 in December 2018.

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TELECOMS.COM: FCC probes how connected cars can be used to 'stalk, harass, and intimidate'

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INSIDE RADIO: Appeals Court Sides With FCC In Case Over Whether Kentucky AM License Should Be Canceled.

Kentucky broadcaster Gerard Parks has been dealt another setback in his effort to revive the license for "Gospel 710" WEKC, Williamsburg, KY. This time it comes in court. A federal appeals court in Washington says Parks "has not shown a clear and indisputable right" for it to overturn a Federal Communications Commission 2020 decision that cancelled the license after several years of annual regulatory fees went unpaid. The FCC also argued its move was justified because Parks failed to file the paperwork seeking a reconsideration of its decision for 18 months, which was well outside the 30-day response deadline.

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MODERN RETAIL: Unpacked: What brands should know about the FCC's new rules on lead generation

Brands will soon have to ensure that they secure express consent send marketing calls or

texts to customer, with federal rules changing to prevent companies from creating "a tsunami of unwanted robocalls." The Federal Communications Commission in December put out an order regarding a change in how it will implement the Telephone Consumer Protection Act, the federal law that governs marketing calls and texts. The rule will require texters and callers that do robocalls or robotexts to have "express written consent" for a single seller at a time.

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AMERICAN THINKER: Can Elon Musk liberate our internet access? (Opinion)

In November 2023, the Biden FCC issued a Prevention and Elimination of Digital Discrimination (PEDD) order. This order forbids any internet access practices that "differentially impact consumers' access to broadband internet access service based on their income level, race, ethnicity, color, religion or national origin, or are intended to have such differential impact." The lawless test of differential impact (rather than differential treatment) became ordinary for such regulations. ...Commissioner Brendan Carr perfectly characterized this ruling in his excellent dissent: "The Biden Administration's entire approach to the Internet ... can be boiled down to one word: control. ... You can see it in the Biden Administration's campaign to pressure Internet companies into censoring Americans' protected political speech — a coordinated effort that is now on appeal to the Supreme Court." The size, scope, power, and control of the federal government have expanded dramatically since President Joe Biden was sworn into office. 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WAMC-FM: New York state Assemblyman Phil Steck looks to improve cell service in Town of Colonie

"One of the difficulties that we've had over the years is we've got calls all the time, about the poor quality of cell coverage in Colonie, particularly in the part of Colonie where I live," said Steck. "And folks don't understand this is not really a state issue. This is a federal issue. But however, because it's such a persistent problem, we need to get active and get the federal government to help us out on these things. And that's what we're working on now. Would I like to be able to snap my fingers and fix the problem? Yes. Do I think it would be the same for our town supervisor? Yes. But what we have to do is enlist the federal

government because a lot of cell services regulated by the Federal Communications Commission, not by state agencies."

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HEALTHCARE FINANCE NEWS: Elevance Health increasing access to smartphones in bid to tackle digital divide

The effort is a result of a collaboration between Elevance Health and Verizon, together with Samsung, AT&T and T-Mobile. It's supported by funding from the Federal Communications Commission's Affordable Connectivity Program. Elevance said its program is different from other ACP benefits because of its high-quality offerings, customization and healthcare focus.

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MLIVE: Fear of 5G exposure leads to shaky reception of proposed cell tower at school

District leaders said the tower would be built 200 feet from the school building, which is in accordance with federal guidelines. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC), which regulates cell towers and provides guidance on exposure to radiofrequency emissions, has deemed cell towers to be safe near schools and homes. Cottrell, who lives about 5 miles from Forest Hills Eastern, said she believes the district should not rely solely on FCC guidance, which she said is outdated and does not address research on the risks to children of long-term exposure to cell tower radiation.

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NORTH JERSEY: Simple ways to clean your smart watch, phone, AirPods and other electronics

The F.C.C. recommends that you give your smart device a cleaning everyday as a preventative measure. You can clean your device with a lint-free cloth "slightly dampened with soap and water." The F.C.C. warns to keep liquids and moistures away from the openings on your device. You should not spray cleaners directly on to your device and you should avoid using cleaning solutions that contain bleach or abrasives.

Dish needs to finance the expansion of its nationwide 5G network to compete directly with behemoths like Verizon, T-Mobile and AT&T. Dish managed to reach its FCC-mandated network-buildout targets in the summer of 2023, but it has since put a halt on most

construction efforts as it works to raise more money.

What's known as "equal time" regulations by the FCC would have permitted Oz's opponents to request equal opportunities to access the public airwaves, which broadcast stations generally don't want to have to do.

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BOSTON GLOBE: Will your next television be a NextGen TV?

This time the transition will be kinder and gentler. Consumers who don't want NextGen TV won't have to upgrade their sets anytime soon, and broadcasters don't have to offer the service. TV stations that offer NextGen TV will continue their old-school broadcasts as well. The Federal Communications Commission says stations can keep using the older system

until 2027, and it is open to extending the deadline even further.

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THE NEW YORK POST: Supreme Court poised to end 'constitutional revolution' that's marred US governance for 40 years

For example, in his majority opinion in West Virginia v. EPA, Chief Justice John Roberts commented, "We presume that 'Congress intends to make major policy decisions itself, not leave those decisions to agencies,' " citing US Telecom Ass'n v. FCC. And in his dissent in City of Arlington (Texas) v. FCC, joined by Justice Samuel Alito, he wrote that "The question [of] when an agency enjoys [interpretative authority] must be decided by a court, without deference to an agency."

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DAILY CAMERA: How did we become so divided? (Opinion)

The change can be traced back to 1987 and the repeal of the Federal Communications Commission's Fairness Doctrine. The Fairness Doctrine required broadcasters to provide opposing viewpoints to political or controversial public issues. The Supreme Court unanimously upheld this regulation in 1969 with Justice Byron White writing "without this doctrine, station owners would only have people on the air who agreed with their opinions." Justice White argued that radio frequencies (and by extension television stations) should be used to educate the public about controversial issues in a way that is fair and non-biased so that they can create their own opinions.

The Epoch Times previously reported that Fight Right works in concert with Never Back Down Inc. Never Back Down is Mr. DeSantis' main super PAC. Fight Right, according to Federal Communications Commission disclosures, has ordered about \$642,000 worth of ads with KCAU.

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DALLAS MORNING NEWS: Dallas DirecTV customers to see ABC affiliate WFAA return after companies strike deal

Tegna previously said in a statement that it hoped to reach the deal with DirecTV so football fans wouldn't miss out on the closing weeks of the NFL season. DirecTV has claimed Tegna was denying the company permission to offer its 64 stations for DirecTV,

DirecTV Stream and U-verse homes in Texas. FCC regulations require cable systems to get consent from a TV station to carry its broadcast signal. Cable providers have to pay stations a retransmission fee for this right and contracts usually last a few years. They also negotiate, discussing fees, guidelines and other factors before a contract can be renewed.

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NEXSTAR: New WDEV owners say a change in leadership doesn't mean a change in service

Mermel and business partner Scott Milne have bought Radio Vermont Group and all of its assets from the Squier family, and with FCC approval expected in the next few months, the deal will soon become official. The sale comes less than two months after the death of longtime owner and Vermont Broadcasting Hall of Famer Ken Squier but had been in the works since early 2023.

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INSIDE RADIO: Audacy Sells Phoenix Real Estate For \$10.5 Million.

The Phoenix land sale will deliver some much-needed cash as it follows a move by Audacy this week that began prepackaged chapter 11 proceedings in U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Houston to restructure its balance sheet and reduce its total debt from \$1.9 billion to \$350 million. In a debt-for-equity swap, Audacy's debtholders will receive an ownership stake in the reorganized company. Audacy says it expects that the court will hold a hearing to consider the approval of the reorganization plan in February and to emerge from bankruptcy once the FCC has approved the transaction.

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INSIDE RADIO: News Bites: iHeartMedia/Weezer, Dan Patrick, '24,' 'Cincinnati Edition.'

The FCC has issued a warning to a New York real estate company that owns a building where a pirate station was allegedly based. It warns Matovu Realty that it could face fines of more than \$2.3 million for the unlicensed station operating at 99.3 FM from its building on Decatur Avenue in the Norwood section of the Bronx. FCC is asking the property owner to respond in ten days, providing evidence they no longer permit the pirate station on their property. They are also asked to identify the individuals behind the unlicensed broadcasts. The FCC will use that information to determine what, if any, enforcement action is required.

In this document, the Federal Communications Commission (Commission) requires covered 988 service providers (a new category of service provider) and cable, satellite, wireless, wireline, and interconnected voice over internet protocol (VoIP) providers (originating service providers) to report outages that potentially affect the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline in the Commission's Network Outage Reporting System (NORS).

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FEDERAL REGISTER: Rates for Interstate Inmate Calling Services; Correction

The Federal Communications Commission (Commission) published a document in the Federal Register of January 3, 2024, announcing that the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) had approved, for a period of three years, an information collection associated with the Commission's 2022 ICS Order, FCC 22–76 (September 30, 2022). The document incorrectly announced an effective date for an amendment published on December 9, 2022, which triggered its codification into the CFR on December 21, 2023. This document establishes the applicability of OMB's approval, published on January 3, 2024.

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Social Media Summary

From Jan. 12 to 16, there were around 7,000 social media posts mentioning the FCC. Most content was on Twitter (74%, or around 5,200 posts), followed by Reddit (16%), Forums (7%), Blogs (2%), Comments (1%), and Facebook (0%).

FCC Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel defended a low-income discount program against attacks from GOP lawmakers, pointing out that Republicans criticized an aspect of the program that was decided by Congress, not the commission. In December, Sen. Ted Cruz (R-Texas) and several other Republican lawmakers blasted the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP), which gives \$30 monthly broadband discounts to people with low incomes. The program is set to be discontinued in a few months because Congress hasn't added funding to continue it, though Democrats are pushing a bill that would keep it going.

New data from ACA Connects and consulting firm Cartesian indicates 6.4 million unserved and underserved locations will be eligible for Broadband Equity, Access and Deployment (BEAD) funding, once states and territories begin selecting broadband deployment projects. According to version four of ACA and Cartesian's BEAD framework, the U.S. currently has 10.3 million unserved and underserved locations, but that number is poised to go down by June 2024, when states are likely to begin awarding BEAD money to subgrantees. Further, the 10.3 million locations, determined from the newest version of the Federal Communications Commission's national broadband map, decreased from 12 million eligible BEAD locations found in mapping data from December 2022.

Last week, Spectrum took the next step towards buying another a small cable TV company. After reaching a purchase agreement with Astrea in November, Spectrum and its parent, Charter Communications, is now seeking federal approval to transfer certain assets and authorizations held by the smaller company. Through the transaction, Spectrum said it would acquire Astrea's assets related to telephone, cable TV, and internet services along with its customers, according to a filing with the Federal Communications Commission.

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UTAH NEWS DISPATCH: Pandemic-era internet discount program may end this spring as funds run out

A COVID-era program allowed 22.5 million low-income households across the country to get discounts on internet services. But, the funds allocated for it are running out and if Congress doesn't take action, the program may end this spring. The Affordable Connectivity Program, a high-speed internet initiative, provides discounts of \$30 to \$75 a month on internet bills. It also allows a one-time discount on the purchase of a laptop, desktop or tablet computer. Utah has received more than \$33 million for the program to fund the discount in almost 72,000 households, a White House fact sheet reads. Internet providers have already sent a notice to customers warning them about the potential end of the program at the request of the Federal Communications Commission, said Ariane Schaffer, government affairs and public policy manager at Google Fiber.

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BROADBAND BREAKFAST: FCC Chair Opposes Including Broadband Providers in Universal Service Fund

The head of the Federal Communications Commission wrote to lawmakers that tapping broadband providers for the Universal Service Fund would ultimately increase the burden

on consumers, despite making more money available. The USF spends roughly \$8 billion annually to subsidize internet payments for low-income households, schools, libraries, and healthcare centers, as well as infrastructure in hard-to-reach areas. The program, stood up in 1996, is funded by fees on voice providers. This "has led, and continues to lead, to a smaller and smaller contribution base," as telephone revenues decrease, FCC Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel wrote to Sen. Ben Luján, D-New Mexico.

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BROADBAND BREAKFAST: FCC Enhances Broadband Access on Airplanes and Vessels with New Spectrum Rules

The Federal Communications Commission recently adopted new regulations for the 70/80/90 gigahertz spectrum bands in an effort to expand broadband access on-board airplanes and passenger ships. These regulations, adopted Wednesday, bring updates to existing rules for the 71–76 GHz, 81–86 GHz, 92–94 GHz, and 94.1–95 GHz bands. The changes authorize specific point-to-point connections to moving endpoints within the 70 and 80 GHz bands, aiming to enhance the use of these frequencies for in-flight and maritime broadband services. "Satellite operators see real potential for these bands to expand the capacity of our satellite broadband networks," notes FCC Commissioner Geoffrey Starks in a statement. At the same time, "companies have been eyeing these bands to power faster and cheaper alternatives to satellite on planes, ships, and offshore platforms."

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RADIO WORLD: A Call to Resolve Basic AM Allocation Problems

The FCC has simply been derelict in not moving forward with most of the allocation changes proposed in the AM improvement rulemaking. FM translators are nice, but they don't solve the basic allocation problems of AM stations attempting to make improvements or lower operating costs by changing sites or antenna configurations.

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RADIO WORLD: The FCC Is Considering More Bilingual Upgrades for EAS

The FCC's desire to make alerts issued over EAS available in more languages is raising some technical concerns about the capabilities of the current technical architecture in EAS devices. At its monthly meeting in February, the FCC will consider a draft proposal that, if eventually adopted, would create template alert scripts that would be pre-translated into the 13 most commonly spoken non-English languages in the United States — Spanish, Chinese, Tagalog, Vietnamese, Arabic, French, Korean, Russian, Haitian Creole, German,

Hindi, Portuguese and Italian — as well as in English.

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THE INDIANA GAZETTE: Three groups seek LPFM station on 94.9 in Indiana

Three groups have applied to the Federal Communications Commission for a license to operate a non-commercial low-power radio station on 94.9 megahertz in Indiana, beginning a process that could take several months to resolve, possibly with one company operating with elements of all three applicants. Indiana Broadcasting Corporation, Indiana Radio Syndicate and Worldwide Pants Incorporated made their applications during a window this past fall for new LPFM applications, the window of its kind since 2013.

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LA PROGRESSIVE: Why FCC Regulators Play Shell Games with Broadcasters?

In 1934, Congress passed the Communications Act (since updated by the Telecommunications Act of 1996). This Act established the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to create and enforce rules for how broadcasters must operate under their licenses. The President appoints five Commissioners to head the FCC. They vote on which general rules are to be in place, while Bureaus within the FCC work directly with broadcasters on the details.

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CABLEFAX: How Should the FCC Approach Spectrum Auctions Today?

It has been 30 years since Congress first granted the FCC its spectrum auction authority. But rather than celebrating that milestone, spectrum stakeholders are stuck in a holding pattern as they continue pushing regulators to give the FCC back its power to run the highly successful auctions.

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COMMUNICATIONS DAILY: FCC High-Band Order Changed to Seek Comment on Aerostats

The FCC's 70/80/90 GHz order, approved by commissioners ahead of last week's open meeting (see 2401240077), saw a noteworthy change with the agency now seeking comment in a Further NPRM on the potential inclusion of ship-to-aerostat transmissions as part of maritime operations. The FNPRM also seeks comment on including fixed satellite service (FSS) earth stations in the light-licensing regime for the 70/80 GHz bands, though

that was in the draft.

The FCC later said that Dahua cameras "pose an unacceptable risk to U.S. national security," the report says. Then, after Ligado arose from LightSquared's bankruptcy in 2015, it managed to score approvals from the FCC for its plan, this time focusing on 5G.

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ANDROID HEADLINES: Samsung's Galaxy A35 & Galaxy A55 inch closer to launch

The Galaxy A35 has also got an official support page on the Samsung UAE website with the same model number. While none of these listings give us more information, these are an indication of a nearing launch. The FCC recently certified the Galaxy A35 with the model numbers SM-A356U, SM-A356U1, SM-A356V, and SM-A356E. The units with "U1" and "V" suffixes in model numbers are unlocked and Verizon versions of the same phone for the US.

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) said the out of use satellite posed a threat to active satellites. "As satellite operations become more prevalent and the space economy accelerates, we must be certain that operators comply with their commitments," FCC enforcement bureau chief Loyaan Egal said. "This is a breakthrough settlement, making very clear the FCC has strong enforcement authority and capability to enforce its vitally important space debris rules."

Breezeline will also work to continue private/public partnerships, including a project to extend its fiber network to over 1,200 unserved homes and businesses in King William County, Virginia starting this year. The multi-year build is being jointly funded by Breezeline and a \$1.5 million subsidy from the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund (RDOF) administered by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). CCG Consulting's Doug Dawson in a note this month said the FCC is "getting serious" about RDOF defaults, as it could be disruptive if providers back out of their commitments after the BEAD grant process is underway.

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FIERCE WIRELESS: DoJ asks court to dismiss Ligado's \$40B claim

The government's suit, filed January 25, 2024, in the U.S. Court of Federal Claims, said that for decades, Ligado sought approval from the FCC to obtain a modified license to operate a terrestrial network within L-band spectrum when the license previously allowed for only satellite use. For years, federal agencies, including the DoD and NTIA, objected to Ligado's proposed license modifications on the grounds it could cause harmful interference with GPS, which operates in nearby spectrum bands.

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BROADBAND BREAKFAST: FCC Commissioner Brendan Carr, Elon Musk Swipe Over Starlink at Biden, FCC

Federal Communications Commissioner Brendan Carr criticized a decision by the commission to turn down subsidies for SpaceX's Starlink broadband satellite constellation after the Joe Biden administration announced earlier this month funding for wireline broadband networks in North Carolina. The White House on January 18 outlined a plan by the U.S. Treasury Department to spend \$82 million from the Capital Projects Fund to link 16,000 homes throughout the tarheel state to broadband. The funds will be infused into the state's Broadband Stop Gap Solutions Program, an effort to expand broadband networks into areas that lack access.

INSIDE RADIO: Nebraska Owner Gets FCC Fine For Several Unauthorized Transfers Of Control.

It was not one, but three, unauthorized transfers of control that the Media Bureau discovered when it was recently processing another transfer request filed by the owners of "106 Kix Country" KQKX and "News Talk 780" WJAG in Norfolk, NE. The three occurred between 2017 and 2019 among William "W.H." Huse, Karla Huse, and Eugene Huse. Under an agreement with the FCC, the Huse family's WJAG Inc. agrees to pay an \$8,000 fine and sign a compliance plan that will see it file reports with the FCC for three years verifying it is following transfer of control rules. The company also agrees to appoint a compliance officer and create a compliance training program.

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THE RECORD: Feds say anti-robocall efforts appear to be working against foreign sources

The U.S. government said on Tuesday that telecom "gateway providers" appear to be doing a better job blocking scam-oriented international robocalls from reaching Americans. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) said its efforts with the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) "reduced apparently illegal robocall traffic across multiple networks." The two agencies reached out last year to seven major gateway providers — companies that serve as "on ramps" for international calls to the U.S. — urging them to do more to cut down potentially fraudulent voice-call spamming.

Educational Media Foundation had acquired the rights to the KLUV calls and its Dallas market "K-Love" trademark rights as part of its acquisition of Audacy's stations in Buffalo and Memphis last year. Following 98.7 KLUV Dallas' rebranding as "98.7 The Spot" KSPF in June, the call letters were parked on the Construction Permit for 89.7 KLHU Huron SD, which was granted by the FCC on June 26.

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VIA SATELLITE: FCC Adopts Guidance on Orbital Debris Mitigation Rules

The FCC adopted guidance during its January meeting on orbital debris mitigation rules to provide clarity and guidance to satellite operators. The FCC adopted an Order on Reconsideration on Jan. 25 to address issues raised by Boeing, EchoStar, Hughes Network Services, Planet Labs, Spire Global, Telesat, SpaceX, and Amazon in response to the Commission's 2020 Orbital Debris Mitigation Report. The order addresses a number of concerns including the burden on applicants, maneuverability, and a case-by-case regulatory approach.

To protect consumers from SIM-swap attacks, the Federal Communications Commission announced new rules last year to "require wireless providers to adopt secure methods of authenticating a customer before redirecting a customer's phone number to a new device or provider. The new rules require wireless providers to immediately notify customers whenever a SIM change or port-out request is made on customers' accounts and take additional steps to protect customers from SIM swap and port-out fraud." But an Ars review found these new rules may be too vague to be effective.

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THE STAR: US prisons use new tech to dial down illegal cellphones

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC), which regulates communications technology in the US, has been wary of signing off on full-blown signal jamming but cleared the way within the last few years for states like South Carolina to implement so-called "contraband interdiction systems".

Two more telecommunications providers defaulted on census blocks and service locations awarded under a federal broadband deployment subsidy program. Missouri-based broadband provider Co-Mo Connect and Texas-based telephone provider Coleman County Telephone Cooperative defaulted on five census blocks and three locations, respectively, citing high construction costs. Both companies received funding through a reverse auction from the Federal Communications Commission's Rural Digital Opportunity Fund. RDOF calls for spending \$20.4 billion over 10 years to bring fixed broadband and voice services to millions of unserved homes and small businesses in rural America.

Another nine companies have finished swapping out communications equipment from Huawei and ZTE since January, the Federal Communications Commission said in a new report to Congress, bringing the total to 14. The Secure and Trusted Communications Networks Act of 2019 authorized the agency to reimburse providers for replacing gear from the two Chinese companies, which are considered security risks by U.S. lawmakers.

The CE and FCC certified solution works with its private 4G/5G systems, geared towards industrial and public sector markets, as well as with public 4G/5G networks. It supports beyond visual line-of-sight (BVLOS) operations. It is being sold in the US, where it gained FCC approval at the end of last year, with its DAC and MPW private 4G/5G systems via the likes of Kyndryl, DXC Technology, Future Technologies Venture, Graybar, and Trilogy NextGen, plus via the enterprise solutions units of operators AT&T and Verizon.

The president has said he would expand his executive authority to have more control over parts of the government that have historically been allowed significant independence, and his allies have outlined specific plans for some agencies — the Federal Reserve, for example. The outcome could be a president who can use these agencies to carry out his agenda, whether that's ordering the Fed to adjust rates to please the public in an election year even if they devastate the economy long-term, or using the powers of the DOJ to prosecute his political enemies, or ordering the FCC to pull licenses from or otherwise

constrain news networks that report critically on him.

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INSIDE RADIO: News Bites: KCRW, Cynthia Canty, KPET, South Carolina Public Radio.

KPET Lamesa, TX (690), which went silent after the death of station owner David Stewart, has returned to broadcasting after a year of being off the air. Fred Morton, who was the business partner of Stewart, succeeded in his goal of returning the station to the market. "We're just getting the place back on the air. But, we had to beat an FCC deadline to get that done, and that's why I'm here in the middle of summer," he tells KCBD-TV. The station, which was also simulcast on the Lamesa-licensed FM translator K235CZ at 94.9, is back playing classic country music, along with local news and weather information.

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RADIO & TELEVISION BUSINESS REPORT: An 'Awesome' Buy, East of Phoenix

Drive on U.S. 60 or Loop 202 across Mesa, Chandler and rapidly growing Queen Creek, Ariz., to the southeast of downtown Phoenix, and you'll likely scan up a unique and "Awesome" Classic Hits station at 96.5 MHz playing everything from Graham Nash's "Sleep Song" to Betty Everett's "Shoop Shoop Song." Pending FCC approval, the FM signal covering these cities that's tied to an FM translator atop Shaw Butte in Phoenix will be in the hands of a first-time husband-and-wife ownership team.

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RADIO & TELEVISION BUSINESS REPORT: Gray Successfully Completes A Marquee Deal

It is a move that could possibly lead to a thaw in regulatory policy when it comes to local broadcast television ownership limits. On June 19, the FCC's Media Bureau, headed by Holly Saurer, gave its approval to a swap of stations between Brian and Patricia Lane's Marquee Broadcasting and Gray Television.

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BROADCASTING AND CABLE: Stopping Newspapers From Going the Way of the Dinosaurs (B+C Guest Blog)

At the dawn of broadcasting, the public benefits of common ownership of newspapers and stations were acknowledged by the Federal Communications Commission. It encouraged newspapers to invest in radio and television to boost these technologies and expand media

availability. Newspapers were endowed with the financial resources and journalistic talent needed to operate radio and television stations, which accelerated the latter's growth and audience reach.

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INSIDE RADIO: Update To New York Law Governing Al's Use In Political Ads Welcomed By Broadcasters.

NYSBA says the new law makes it clear that federal law controls with respect to editing or adding labels to political campaign ads. Under federal law and Federal Communications Commission rules, broadcasters are prohibited from censoring any ads from candidates or their authorized committees. The New York update now makes it clear that the federal guidelines have priority. That means rather than a requirement that stations put labels on political ads that contain Al-generated voices and images, the new law requires a station to implement a policy regarding political Al.

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WFMY-TV: TV station applications swamp FCC

This year, WFMY News 2 turns 75. To celebrate, we're opening the News 2 Vault. TV was still in its beginning stages. WFMY News 2 had started, but other stations were trying to get off the ground. Hundreds sent applications to the Federal Communications Commission. The files had to be checked and photocopied before processing. Then a team of lawyers, engineers, and technicians checked the applications and submitted reports on each phase.

The creditors, led by an investment firm headed by liberal billionaire George Soros, in turn, will take control of the company. Judge Christopher Lopez approved the plan on Feb. 20 and Audacy now awaits approval from the Federal Communications Commission before it can emerge from bankruptcy under the new ownership. The company expects to earn FCC approval sometime in the third quarter, which ends Sept. 30.

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PCMAG: Judy Garland, James Dean Return as Al Voices to Read You the News

Voice cloning and AI-generated deepfake robocalls have also been a growing concern more broadly as generative AI tools continue to develop. Last week, the FCC asked US telecom providers what they're doing to prevent and stop AI-powered deepfake voices from being used to conduct scam call campaigns in the country.

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NEWSNATION: What is Project 2025?

A main component is the firing of as many as 50,000 federal workers who conservative groups say will get in the way of his agenda. T-Mobile uses its 5G cellular network to send internet to homes wirelessly. Since the service's launch in 2021, T-Mobile has become one of the biggest internet service providers around -- covering 60% of homes in the US, according to the most recent data from the Federal Communications Commission. That's the fourth-largest footprint of any provider, behind only satellite internet providers, which are available virtually everywhere.

Over the weekend, an FCC filing appeared to confirm a UWB chip for the Pixel Watch 3. (FCC documents shut down the notion for the Pixel Watch 2 last year.) The 5030 MHz band (5030-5091 MHz) can be a home for A2X applications. The band has been identified globally for aviation operations, it has sufficient spectrum to support a 20 MHz A2X channel, and, as mid-band spectrum, it strikes an appropriate balance of coverage and capacity for dense drone operations. The Federal Communications Commission is considering a Report and Order that, if adopted, would allocate a portion of the 5030 MHz band for control non-payload communications. While this allocation is separate from A2X detect and avoid communications, the two can coexist in separate portions of the 5030 MHz band. The FCC should therefore consider an allocation of a channel for A2X in the future.

ORLANDO SENTINEL: Another new big rocket makes debut with launch of Ariane 6

Amazon is eagerly awaiting all three rockets to get up to speed as it awarded a massive launch contract back in 2022 to get the majority of 3,236 internet satellites that are part of the Project Kuiper constellation into space. That contract called for up to 83 launches among the three big rockets over five years, but half of them have to be in place by July 2026 as part of Amazon's license with the Federal Communications Commission.

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Social Media Summary

The government has been stepping up its efforts to combat deepfakes. On May 22, Federal Communications Commission Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel proposed a new rule that

would require political TV, video and radio ads to disclose if they used AI-generated content. The FCC has been concerned about AI use in this election cycle's ads, with Rosenworcel pointing out potential issues with deep fakes and other manipulated content.

Regulations involving tech and national security are only growing. In 2020, the Federal Communications Commission designated Chinese telecoms Huawei and ZTE as national security risks. In 2022 it adopted rules prohibiting the companies, and a few others, from receiving licenses for sale in the U.S. This year, President Biden signed a bill aiming to force a divestment of TikTok or ban its use in the country, following years of D.C. debate about the app's owner, Chinese tech giant ByteDance.

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DETROIT FREE PRESS: New tax scams: Schemes use clean energy credits; robocalls say debt is 'noncollectible'

Illegal tax-related robocalling is drawing heat from the Federal Communications Commission. In some cases, the calls refer to a "Tax Dismissal Program" or a "National Tax Relief Program." Neither programs exists, the FCC notes. In April, the IRS and Federal Trade Commission joined the FCC in a "Spring Cleaning" initiative to hang up on the phony tax relief calls. YouMail, a software app company, had estimated that some 15.8 million such tax-relief calls were transmitted during the three months preceding the start of the 2024 tax filing season.

The Federal Communications Commission said the agency is going to need another \$3 billion if it's to keep its promise to reimburse all the companies who agreed to rip out and replace their Chinese-made technology to alleviate security concerns.

Some stations are back on the air, while the Federal Communications Commission said Wednesday that it has learned of a few other signals being down in the wake of Hurricane Beryl. The FCC says Educational Media Foundation's "K-Love" affiliate KLTW (105.3) and Relevant Radio's religious KTEK (1110) are still off the air, along with four FM translators in the region. They include the Houston-licensed K222CX at 92.3 FM; the Houston-licensed K241CM at 96.1 FM; the Houston-licensed K245CQ at 96.9 FM; and the Conroe, TX-licensed K237FS at 95.3 FM. One station the FCC said was off the air Tuesday — Audacy's sports "The Bet 650" KIKK — is back on the air.

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BROADBAND BREAKFAST: FirstNet Modified Contract to Help AT&T Meet Milestones, Says Report

In responding to the inspector general report, FirstNet justified the contractual changes and said its doing so "accounted for the evolution of technology and aligned adoption requirements with the build timeframes that supported it." The report is newly relevant because of increased scrutiny around the FCC's consideration of a proposal to provide an additional 50 megahertz of mid-band spectrum to FirstNet. The spectrum has been valued at more than \$14 billion.

BROADBAND BREAKFAST: USTelecom Wants Big Tech to Fund Low-Income Broadband Plans

The Affordable Connectivity Program should be revived within the Universal Service Fund, and Big Tech should help pay to make it happen. That is what USTelecom, a trade association for major internet service providers, argued to the Federal Communications Commission in a July 8 filing.

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RADIO WORLD: Would My Station Be Able to Go to FM Class A10?

The FCC is taking comments until July 22 on whether it should establish an FM station class called A10. Mississippi broadcaster Carl Haynes believes this would allow hundreds of FM Class A stations to increase power, and that it would be easier than under the previously proposed Class C4. By reducing the required minimum distance separations, the proposal opens the ability for more stations to qualify.

The congressman's measure would also give the Federal Communications Commission the authority to apply the new standards to other emerging technologies "as appropriate."

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CIRCLEID: Net Neutrality: What Is Old Is New Again (Opinion)

On July 22, after considerable political and administrative machinations, the FCC's open Internet Order will take effect, bringing us back to the net neutrality regulatory regime that was in effect in 2015. At a very high level, net neutrality or open Internet is a regulatory question of to what degree the FCC should regulate the ability of Internet service providers to act as content neutral common carriers that must transport Internet traffic in a nondiscriminatory fashion, regardless of its origin or destination.

In addition to people who worked directly for Trump, others who participated in Project 2025 were appointed by the former president to independent positions. For instance, Federal Communications Commissioner Brendan Carr authored an entire chapter of proposed changes to his agency, and Lisa Correnti, an anti-abortion advocate Trump appointed as a delegate to the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, is among the contributors.

The Federal Communications Commission also approved a \$200 million, three-year K-12 cybersecurity pilot program in June, and eligible schools and libraries can use those funds to help secure their networks. A CISA official also recently shared with K-12 Dive the latest cybersecurity resources schools can tap into through the agency, including a free service to scan and test local governments' vulnerabilities within their external networks or public web applications.

Lee noted that the Federal Communications Commission produced a similar report in November 2022. Harvey said she didn't know about that report either. The concerns come as the US continues to restrict technology companies that have connections to the People's Republic of China and Russia. In 2020, the US Federal Communications Commission (FCC) designated network equipment manufacturers Huawei and ZTE as national security threats, preventing companies from purchasing the companies' products using government funds. Last month, the Biden administration formally banned security software maker Kaspersky from offering software or services in the US, over worries that the company could be forced to turn over data to the Russian government.

For some subscribers, the fight doesn't end there. T-Mobile's own online message boards are filled with comments from frustrated customers saying they feel like this is an illegal bait-and-switch. Other posts show some customers eager to sign on to a class action lawsuit, should one come along.

The proposal would require callers to obtain prior express consent to disclose that the caller intends to use AI-generated calls, and to disclose to consumers on each call when they receive an AI-generated call.

After the now-infamous fake Biden robocalls in New Hampshire, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) imposed a limited ban on similar Al-calling efforts. Our interviewees emphasized how easy it is now to create robocallers that do not sound like robots anymore, but uncannily like real people. While the Ashley robocaller (used in New Hampshire) was intentionally created to sound like a robot for transparency purposes, Ilya, a political Al creator working for political campaigns, noted, "[Al-generated voice] already sounds almost exactly the same [as a human]. It will sound absolutely exactly the same." And about such Al chatbots, he said, "There will be more, there will be many more, some of them will have robotic voices and some of them probably won't."

While most attention is rightly being focused on Loper Bright Enterprises v. Raimondo, the Court's ruling in Securities And Exchange Commission v. Jarkesy should not be overlooked. If logically extended, the Jarkesy ruling could influence the use of Administrative Law Judges (ALJs) at the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) or spur a new Congress to demand reforms. For anyone caught in the FCC's ALJ vortex, or who believes in fair processes from a federal agency, this is good news.

In September 2023, a 50/50 partner in a Colorado radio station ownership group agreed to sell his interest in the company. 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TELECOMPETITOR: FCC Considers Relaxing USF Letter of Credit Requirements

The FCC has released a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) that addresses issues related to the letters of credit that providers must carry in order to gain Universal Service Fund (USF) support in deployment of broadband services to high-cost rural areas. Currently, the letters of credit, which are required of "certain broadband providers," come from a qualifying bank and carry a certain value, the FCC said. At issue is that during the past two years, a "significant number" of banks have fallen below the FCC's standards. This creates the possibility that providers whose letters of credit no longer pass muster would be required to obtain new letters from banks that do qualify. This could impact deployment.

The Federal Communications Commission's Affordable Connectivity Program ran out of funding for the popular pandemic-era internet subsidy program at the end of May after Congress was unable to extend its funding. Fruits said he anticipates some indirect influence in that some internet service providers may not find it financially viable to deploy connections to certain areas due to low demand.

An attorney for the Republican primary winner for North Dakota's only U.S. House seat has filed complaints with federal authorities regarding text messages that falsely stated she had dropped out of the heated GOP primary contest on the day of the June 11 election. Her attorney said the messages might be a test for a wider effort this fall. Julie Fedorchak, a longtime public utilities regulator, was the subject of the messages. Attorney Shane Goettle said Tuesday he recently filed complaints on her campaign's behalf with the Federal Election Commission and the Federal Communications Commission and alerted the U.S. Attorney's Office. He alleged election interference and fraudulent use of texting to deceive voters.

Don't hold your breath for a resurgence of government internet subsidies. Republicans and Democrats can't seem to agree on a way forward to fund the program, and passing such bills will only get more difficult as Election Day inches closer. Commissioner Carr tweeted (55k reach, 192 engagements) out a reiteration of his claim that BEAD "has not connected even one person since its 2021 enactment."

SpaceX is providing more details about how its Starlink satellites survived a major solar storm in May without causing major service disruptions. "No satellites were lost due to the storm," the company told the FCC this week.

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ENGADGET: Verizon will pay a \$1 million fine to settle a 911 outage investigation

Verizon has agreed to pay a \$1.05 million penalty to settle a Federal Communications Commission investigation into whether the company broke the agency's rules after a 911 outage. Over a period of one hour and 44 minutes in December 2022, the outage prevented hundreds of emergency calls from going through in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee, the FCC said.

Alas, the U.S. has failed this test before. In the long-running error that allowed the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to regulate broadcast TV and radio content under policies like the Fairness Doctrine, rules were not explicitly stated and the public was rarely informed. Instead, the commission engaged in what was known as "regulation by raised eyebrow." If a broadcaster did not refrain from engaging in controversial programming, as determined by FCC bureaucrats (perhaps acting on congressional or White House requests), it would risk costly challenges to its operating license. The raised eyebrow threatened free speech by transmitting political demands without a paper trail.

Amazon's Starlink rival, Project Kuiper, is going to start testing hundreds of prototype dishes to connect to the company's satellite internet network. The FCC today granted Amazon subsidiary Kuiper Systems special temporary authority to operate "up to 1,000" dish prototypes in various locations across the US. The company filed for the license last month "to validate the over-the-air performance" of the prototype dishes "prior to commencing product manufacturing," Kuiper Systems said in its application to the FCC. Kuiper System plans conduct the tests over a six-month period, starting in April. "Amazon will operate no more than 200 of the CTs [customer terminals] at the same time," the company added.

The Justice Department has decided to intervene in a suit accusing Dish Network of using sham companies to buy spectrum from the Federal Communications Commission at a \$3.3 billion discount, but not to take over litigation of the matter — it wants to end the whole thing.

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KRWG-FM: Internet subsidy helping 68K homes across Southern NM winds down

In New Mexico's 2nd Congressional District, which covers much of Southern New Mexico, 42% of eligible homes – about 68,400 – are receiving the subsidy, according to a dashboard compiled by the Institute for Local Self Reliance. Nationwide, some 27 million households are enrolled in the program, which provides up to \$30 per month (or \$75 per month on tribal lands) toward qualifying families' internet subscriptions, according to the Federal Communications Commission.

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BROADBAND BREAKFAST: Wireless Trade Groups File Suit Against FCC Digital Discrimination Order

A group of wireless trade associations filed Tuesday for judicial review of the Federal Communications Commission's recent digital discrimination order, arguing that the order is contrary to law and exceeds the FCC's statutory authority. Led by the Wireless Infrastructure Association, the suit filed with the United States Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit marks the third legal case to target the FCC's digital discrimination rules since being adopted in November.

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FIERCE WIRELESS: FCC will vote on proposed D2D rules at March meeting

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) will vote at its March 14 Open Meeting on whether to approve a Report and Order and Further Notice of Proposed Rulemaking that provides a framework for how satellite and terrestrial networks should work together to provide connectivity for consumers. The FCC calls this type of cellular-to-satellite communications, which is often referred to as direct-to-device (D2D), "supplemental coverage from space."

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NEXTGOV: FCC staff targeted in phishing attack that cloned agency login site

The Federal Communications Commission on Friday confirmed it was the subject of a phishing operation that deployed a fake login page used by staff to authenticate their credentials. The cloned site, known as a phishing kit, was constructed by hackers who duplicated a legitimate login webpage from identity management vendor Okta, aiming to deceive users into entering in their private account information. It was discovered by cloud security firm Lookout, who announced the findings on Thursday.

It also opens the door for call recipients to file lawsuits and gives state attorneys general a new mechanism to crack down on violators, according to the FCC.

This comes from a 2022 approved FCC filing that allows SpaceX to launch 7,500 second-generation Starlink satellites.

WFAZ has been silent under an FCC Special Temporary Authority, and RadioAlabama Foundation is entering into a Local Marketing Agreement with the church to be terminated on the sale's close.

On December 20, 2023, the FCC said that it had completed all the RDOF long-form application reviews, and it published a final list of 379 recipients with winning bids totaling more than \$6 billion to be paid over 10 years. The FCC published this list after a lengthy process in which several high-profile recipients such as SpaceX's Starlink were denied funds and in which numerous companies defaulted on their RDOF bids in certain locations.

Dish Network might be floundering when it comes to the number of customers actually using its network, but it's winning accolades for building the world's first commercial-grade open RAN 5G network in record time. An application for an LPFM station in Rhode Island has been derailed because the applicant had listed a mailbox at an office supply store as its operating address. Bump FM, a Providence non-profit that has been streaming gospel-formatted hip hop and rap from its website since 2018, sought to broadcast on 95.1 FM from Glocester. It applied for a CP during the December LPFM window. But Bump FM listed a Smithfield address on Putnam Pike as where it would be operating from. The only problem? The address came back to a mailbox at a Staples office supply store. Aaron Read, chief engineer at The Public's Radio network, filed an informal objection pointing this out. FCC rules require an operating address to be a "campus" or "physical headquarters" within 10 miles of a proposed transmitter site.

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SC MEDIA: Cyber Trust Mark labeling for IoT devices approved by FCC

Mounting cybersecurity vulnerabilities impacting consumer internet-of-things devices has prompted the Federal Communications Commission to approve the voluntary U.S. Cyber Trust Mark labeling program that seeks to ensure security standard adherence among IoT devices, according to CyberScoop.

The FCC took up the issue of channel blackouts and contract disputes between distributors and broadcasters earlier this year when it proposed requiring satellite and cable pay TV providers to give customers affected by channel blackouts a rebate when they don't receive channels they pay for.

Last week, the FCC approved raising the national Internet speed benchmark to 100 Mbps for download and 20 Mbps for upload. That's a significant increase to the current standard of 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload. The FCC ruled that 5G services can be considered high speed if they offer 35 Mbps down and 3 Mbps up. This may not seem like a major move, but it should help millions of Americans cut the cord. Currently many Americans who only have 25 Mbps down or less struggle with cord cutting. You need about 20 Mbps down to watch one 4K stream on Netflix. To watch four 4K streams at once, you need 80 Mbps to 100 Mbps for most services. The FCC will be helping millions of Americans cut the Internet cord as it helps fund this speed increase.

The federal government hasn't passed any laws targeting election misinformation fueled by AI, although the Federal Communications Commission issued an agency rule cracking down on AI-assisted robocalls earlier this year, after the fake Biden voice made national news.

But voice clones, sometimes called audio deepfake tech, are also controversial. A partly audio-deepfaked scam also recently saw a Hong Kong company swindled out of \$25.6 million. The FCC is so concerned about potential abuses of audio deepfake tech that it even recently outlawed digital voices from being used as part of telemarketing calls.

The Federal Communications Commission, for example, adopted a new rule in 2022 "requiring satellite operators in low-Earth orbit to dispose of their satellites within 5 years of completing their missions." But no set international policies exist, which means that future launches — as well as debris already in space — will pose a risk to new space missions.

In response to the pay TV industry's support of an FCC proposal to require MVPDs to report blackouts resulting from impasses in retransmission consent negotiations, the National Association of Broadcasters has filed a brief with the FCC that disputes the notion that retransmission disputes are increasingly resulting in blackouts of broadcast signals for pay TV subscribers.

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BROADBAND BREAKFAST: Telecom Associations Challenge FCC Data Breach Rules

Major broadband trade groups are asking federal judges to block Federal Communications Commission data breach rules. NCTA, CTIA, and USTelecom, three of the largest telecommunications trade associations, jointly filed a petition for review in the D.C Circuit Court of Appeals on March 15, but the case was moved to the Sixth Circuit on March 20.

Two similar challenges to the same rules were consolidated in the circuit early this month.

Infrastructure funded by the program will have to provide speeds of at least 100 Mbps symmetric. The Rural Utility Service, the USDA agency administering ReConnect, will review the eligibility of other FCC subsidy participants on a case-by-case basis. ReConnect participants will also have to participate in the Affordable Connectivity Program, or any successor program, according to the notice of funding opportunity.

An internet service provider has been fined \$10,000 for lying to the Federal Communications Commission about where it offers broadband service in an effort to block its competitors from receiving government grants. A company executive also confessed to submitting the inaccurate coverage data to prevent other ISPs from obtaining federal and state subsidies to serve the region.

One, the Election Commission of India must implement strict guidelines for creation and distribution of such AI-enabled deepfakes in the run-up to the elections. Examples of such crackdowns exist around the world, including the U.S. Federal Communications

Commission's recent ruling of robocalls using Al-generated voices as illegal.

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Social Media Summary

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FORBES: TV Stations & Broadcast Networks At Odds Over Streaming Content Fees

The local TV station network affiliates groups have been petitioning the FCC to amend its regulation regarding the classification of virtual MVPDs which stream video content over the Internet instead via traditional cable to subscribers. At issue is whether vMVPD distributors such as YouTube TV, Hulu + Live TV, Sling TV and Fubo should be re-classified as a traditional cable operator (i.e., ComcastComcast 0.0%, Charter, DirecTV, etc.) by the FCC.

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PATCH: Internet Bills In PA Could Spike After Federal Program Ends

April was the last fully funded month of the Affordable Connectivity Program, a federal initiative created under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law of 2021. The program provided a monthly discount on internet bills of up to \$30 for eligible households and up to \$75 for households on Native American tribal lands. As of February, more than 600,000 Pennsylvania households relied on the program to pay for high-speed internet service, according to the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission. Nationwide, more than 23 million households were enrolled in the program. The program ended due to a lack of additional funding from Congress, according to the Federal Communications Commission.

said Thursday during a Wiley panel discussion called "Opportunities to Reform FCC Enforcement." As the FCC describes, CB radios operate on 40 shared channels on what's known as a "take-turns" basis. That means that it's open to the public and one should never assume that any conversation is completely private, as anyone within range can intentionally or accidentally overhear it. CB can be quite useful for up-to-date road conditions and police reports, with Channel 9 generally reserved for distress and emergency calls. Due to their

usefulness and ease of access, CBs are common among truckers, farmers, and numerous types of trade workers.

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ANDROID POLICE: What's the deal with airplane mode?

Part of the answer might lie in this tidbit in a statement I received from the Federal Aviation Authority: "The FAA requires airlines to show that any technology they introduce does not affect an airplane's safety or communications systems." On top of the FAA putting the burden of proof on the airlines, "the FCC prohibits cellular phone calls on airborne aircraft." That's right — there are actually two different agencies with rules governing the use of cellular devices on airplanes.

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THE DAILY JOURNAL: Cell facilities in San Mateo (Opinion)

As a neurosurgeon who operates on patients with brain cancer, I'm concerned with the well documented links between glioblastomas and radiation exposure. There is false reassurance given by the wireless industry that cell facilities operate within FCC radiation guidelines. Your landlord or apartment leasing office can recommend but not force you to use a certain internet provider. A recent FCC ruling prohibits revenue sharing between property owners and ISPs and requires owners to disclose exclusive marketing arrangements to

"promote tenant choice and competition in the provision of communications services" for tenants.

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CNET: Find Free Wi-Fi Almost Anywhere Your Travels Take You. Here's How

In response to the pandemic, the Federal Communications Commission created the Keep Americans Connected initiative to help people keep their broadband and telephone connectivity in 2020. Additionally, providers like Comcast, Charter Communications and Altice USA extended free Wi-Fi to anyone (customers and noncustomers). Some of these programs are no longer active in these post-pandemic times, but it's still worthwhile to check with your local ISP.

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CNET: Moving? Do Not Wait to Set Up Your Internet Service. Here's How to Do It

When moving into a new apartment, check with the leasing office to see if the complex has a primary internet provider. While the Federal Communications Commission seeks to increase broadband competition in apartments, your apartment may be wired for a specific internet service type, such as cable, fiber or even fixed wireless. In such cases, your best option will likely be to go with whatever provider serves the complex, but you may be able to seek out other options. Again, speak with your leasing office about what's available before moving in.

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GOVTECH: A Fixed-Wireless Approach Helping Connect Wise County

Military users have priority access to it, but in 2020 the FCC auctioned licenses on a county-by-county basis. Nextlink secured one for Wise County. Nextlink's tech partner is Tarana, which had developed technology using the model employed by cellphone networks to deliver wireless service at speeds comparable to those achieved using cable. Another witness pointed out a recent Federal Communications Commission decision that may put broadband into the same category as other telecommunications. Monica Aken of Viaero Wireless told the committee that, with the FCC decision last week on net neutrality, broadband is now under the same category as a common carrier. SB 91 will allow broadband and communications providers a more clear path forward on internet access, she said.

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MADISON COUNTY EAGLE: Firefly broadband project progressing

As part of the original VATI grant application for the RISE project, areas covered via an FCC grant to other companies were added, forcing those companies to either enter into agreements to build out their projects within three years (half the time required by the federal grant regulations) or give up the areas and funding allowing them to be taken over by Firefly.

But streaming media content is still a widespread obstacle on the reservation, with only less than 4% of those living on the Navajo Nation having access to the most basic wireline broadband, according to the Federal Communications Commission and National Telecommunications and Information Administration.

You should always cast a wide net when you're fishing for internet providers in your neighborhood, and the best place to start is the Federal Communications Commission's website. Federal regulations require that ISPs disclose basic information like the addresses they cover and the speeds they offer. The FCC then displays this information in its Broadband Map.

The state Attorney General's Office Election Law Unit ultimately identified the source of the false AI-generated recording as two Texas-based companies, Life Corporation and Lingo Telecom. In response to the incident, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) banned robocalls with AI-generated voices.

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Social Media Summary

The US government has pressured telcos to rip out network gear made by Chinese companies Huawei and ZTE but has allocated only about 38 percent of the money needed to replace equipment with non-Chinese hardware, the Federal Communications Commission said. FCC Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel wrote to Congress Thursday, urging lawmakers to fully fund the program. Congress allocated \$1.9 billion for replacements of Chinese gear that must be removed as early as this month, but the needed reimbursements add up to nearly \$5 billion, Rosenworcel wrote.

Apollo Global Management and Sony's bid to buy Paramount Global faces significant hurdles to get the deal past Democratic-led federal regulators amid antitrust concerns, The Post has learned. Paramount – which ended exclusive merger talks with Skydance Media last Friday – owns the CBS network, its Hollywood studio and 28 local stations – including 17 CBS affiliates in markets like New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. Apollo, which teamed with Sony to make a \$26 billion all-cash bid for the Shari Redstone-controlled media conglomerate, faces an uphill fight to circumvent the FCC's 39% cap on the reach by local affiliates should the merger be approved by Paramount's board, multiple sources told The Post.

Trevedi also praised the acts enshrinement of strong Data Minimization principles. Data Minimization would prevent service providers from collecting user data beyond what the service requires. However, Trivedi expressed skepticism toward APRA for its transfer of preemption authority from the Federal Communications Commission to the Federal Trade Commission. The FTC, he believes, would not have the same specialized capability of regulating service providers as the FCC.

The move marks an important inflection point. TV commercials have long stood as the cornerstone of modern advertising. This dominance was owed, in part, to TV's capacity to reach vast and diverse audiences through ads that leverage sound, sight and motion to evoke emotional responses.
